Weekly Highlights

Episode 9-Wednesday, March 1st After last weeks excitement of a live Show in front of a studio audience, the trio were settled back into the Broadcast Studio.

Tonight's Show felt very familiar, great music, funny stories and a whatta ya at?.

The setlist was interesting, originals, Hynes and two wonderful guest acoustic performances by welcomed guests **Kris + Dee**. No covers or Dylan.

This is a quicker one. "I mentioned Ron Hynes in the interview. Ron is of course, those of you who know me, know that Ron is my... Ken, "Yeah I am so looking forward to the gig down Picton way. I used to come down to the Acoustic Grill (thanks Mr. Grant for helping him remember the name). At one point we did three times a year. I recorded a live record there early on. That was with just me and Dave Mowat and Ken Layton as the trio. The record is wacky." Mr. Grant then had a one-liner of his own, "oh rub it in." This was before Ken started working with Mr. Grant, how weird is that.

Ken continues, "You were there for plenty of shows after. We used to bring the pedal steel and the big amps in there with Dave Fisher on drums and you playing bass. Man we had that place rocking."

I laughed at this super quick Ken one-liner "Has anybody found Debbie yet? Debbie is missing in the internet." No worries Barry said she was found, lol.

Skit #6 A classic Ken Tizzard where did all that come from story!

Ken, "My friend Hynze came by today and brought me these. This is some merch from the Watchmen like back in (he does not give a date, he looks at the back). Our website back then, we had one of the first websites for a band, EVER. And the website was http://www.magic.mb.ca/~watchmen/ (I tried, it doesn't work). I remember we were doing something on MuchMusic and they said to us so what's this new website thing, what's the address and everybody just turned their heads to me (Ken messed it up, but really who could remember that long a website name). I was so forking embarrassed. This was way back in the day."

Ken was always the "tech" person in the band and really did do some pretty progressive things with the Watchmen. When Ken mentioned MuchMusic it reminded me, do you remember all the big glitzy MuchMusic award ceremonies? In 1998, the Watchmen won the award for best use of new technology. I'm laughing because the actual "award" was one of those massive poster boards. So ridiculously impractical. Ken believes it might be in our basement somewhere.

When the Show is starting to wrap up Ken will check in with the Goats to see what they have been up to. This often leads to interesting and entertaining discussions.

Five Minutes with Mr. Grant

Great title idea thanks to Richard's, another regular viewers comment, "Love 5 min w Mr Grant. Have to have that every week." We enjoyed two 5 minute segments this evening.



When Mr. Grant was asked what's new in your world. He wanted to reflect on a local musician who recently passed. I will use Ken's words from earlier in the Show. "I just found out a local gentleman musician Tom Barber died and I know his family as well. You have known him for quite some time haven't you Mr. Grant? (They both have known him for about 20 years).

He's been involved in lots of the Westben shows that we have put off over the years. I've got lots of great pictures of him on stage with his guitar with a big smile on his face... A big lost to the community here... Cheers to Tommy Barber, another guitar player gone from the area."

Back to Mr. Grant and Ken reminiscing. Even though I really don't know many of the people they were mentioning, they were so passionate and talked from the heart, I thought it was endearing. I'm going to share a few moments from their talk. Mr. Grant, "I was sad to hear about Tom. I remember seeing him one of the first times I saw him on stage he played a song by Little Feat called Roll'Um Easy. He was the only guitar player that I had seen other than Little Feat, brave enough to cover that song. He did a really good job. And inspired me to cover it 15 years later." Ken, "Super cool guy, great guitar player." Mr. Grant added, "He was a mellow influence to all those around him, very friendly, personable."

Ken interjected, "No it's 1000 years." Mr. Grant confirms it's the 100th year for our local Campbellford District High School. The Cymbol will be doing a performance sometime over the weekend. We will keep you informed.

Mr. Grant, "Peter Brennan lives in London, Ontario and he runs a band called Jeans 'n Classics. He was a whiz at writing out music in high school and pursued that into a career. He takes various songs from various bands. He usually takes one band and does a whole show around that bands catalog. And he writes out all the parts for the symphony orchestra." I googled Jeans 'n Classics, a very interesting concept.

The last member Mark Burgess. Mr. Grant, "Mark lives in Cobourg and the last I heard he is an advertising." Ken was wondering, "What is that bass, is it an original Höfner?" Mr. Grant, "It was just like an original Höfner. It was called a Kent and we used to razz him about his guitar. Then it was time for the end of Show tagline. Ken was very hopeful. Ken, "Once again I have no closing words so I am just going to say hmmm, what am I going to say this time, I was hoping something was just going to come out, I was hoping it would just flow." Neil tried to help out, "Just reach out to the people that you love and let them know it." Ken thought this was a good idea and then messed it up, "Yeah that is a great sentiment for the night. For tonight reach out to the people that you love and let them know it. Unless you're a stalker."

And with that the **Whiskey Wednesday Show Comedy Hour(s)** and my recap is almost over. Nine skits, eight songs and one Whatta ya at? in two parts, no wonder it was an extra long Episode.

Punk's Not Dead. It's Just A Little Older...

KenCon (Ken Content) goes out the window on theme nights. No originals, no Hynes, no Dylan, all covers. I'm going to do my best to do a music review. I will say upfront I am not very familiar with punk rock, only what Ken has shared with me. We have been together 30 years so he has shared quite a bit, lol. I may have one or two skits or one-liners as well.

Ken started the evening with a disclaimer, "We are going to play a couple of punk rock tunes for you. We are generally, I don't know what, country, folk, Americana whatever you want to call it. Most of the punk rock comes from the attitude and the intention. It's really not about the aggression or the clothing... We are going to start the night off with **Stiff Little Fingers** (**Wasted Life**)."

After this song, Ken, "A little Stiff Little Fingers. I believe the drummer's birthday is today, he would be in his 60s I think." This sparked an idea. I like to have a focus when writing. I'm going to do a little bio on the bands covered this evening and have some fun comparing photos.

Stiff Little Fingers formed in 1977 in Belfast, Northern Ireland. Their first album, *Inflammable Material*, made the world aware of The Troubles and is generally considered to be one of the greatest punk albums of all time. They were there at the start of the punk rock movement and are still recording and touring today.

Ken, "So I wrote my letter today. I wrote my letter to the OFF! people. Fourteen is the last time I wrote a fan letter. I wrote as a fan and as the Whiskey Wednesday host. I'm going to try to get **Keith Morris** on the Show. We are going to see him in May. See if I can get Keith Morris to give me five minutes... I sent them a

picture of me when I was in my first band when I was 13 or 14 singing a song wearing a Circle Jerks T-shirt. And then a picture of me at Lee's Palace where they are playing, the last time I played (Lee's Palace), I had my OFF! hat on and my OFF! shirt, a ridiculous amount of OFF! merch... It would be cool to talk to Keith Morris he has been a pioneer of rock 'n' roll for an awful long time. In all honesty I wouldn't really know what to say to him." Fingers crossed. now that would be an interesting whatta ya at?



After talking about his gushing fan letter he came up with these one-liners, "I'm rambling. Oh right, we're live, sorry I was just talking to the guys for a second. Hey everybody, how are you doing? I forgot about the audience. How strange is that." If it's your first time watching, this is not strange at all, regulars are used to this. Ken then introduced the next song.

Ken, "The **Ramones** had their most successful commercial hit with a song called **Pet Sematary** which was written for the Stephen King movie of the same name... It's a great song, I know you guys all know Blitzkrieg Bop, this is one that I particularly like and the band has been playing it for a long time and it's punk rock night so we are going to play it." Logically you would think they started to play the song now, nope Ken goes off on a tangent.

He gets distracted by viewers comments, Neil's granddog Farley said hi to Stanley Neil's dog, who is always by his feet.


And then Ken had a déjà vu conversation with Mike Buhler while we all watched, lol.

"Hey everybody, how are you doing?"

Ken looked like he was getting back to the Ramones instead he started strumming the Gretsch and dramatically singing, "I have no one to blame, for my capo being displained (btw not a word) by a single fret or a half step tone, if I had someone I would call them on the phone (stops singing). This is what song writing with Ken is like. This is why I write 1000 for every one that is good. I will put that one in the book as, I'll call that one, Unknown Phone Number. That will sit in my pile of rejected songs." I asked Ken what happened. Basically he had his capo in the wrong position and was covering up.

After this song, "There you go a little *Pet Sematary* from the Ramones. *Pet Sematary* came out in 88, 87, no it might have even been earlier 83, 82 (I checked the book was released in 83 and the song/movie in 89). I was listening to other Ramones stuff then. That wasn't a common song on the playlists, you know the cassettes that me and my mates were spreading around. Back then we used to burn off cassettes, John Pastore

around. Back then we used to burn off cassettes, John Pastore (tonight's guest) was a member of the cassette burning club. Now he does it on a much larger level for Outer Battery Records, it's no longer cassettes." Ken always does a great job segueing into the whatta ya at?. We had an extended Ken with the Goats skit and a song to enjoy first.



Ramones were an American punk rock band that formed in the New York City neighborhood of Forest Hills, Queens, in 1974. They are often cited as the first true punk rock group. Despite only achieving limited commercial success during their time together, the band is today seen as highly influential.

Adventures in town

Ken, "My eyes are off. I went to see my doctor and he said your interocular pressure has been high for seven years straight. And I said I can't smoke any more weed. I'm sorry this early onset glaucoma is just going to have to take me over I can't possibly smoke anymore weed. And he said that is not the solution that's a myth. And I said oh what should I be doing? He said you were supposed to be taking those drops that I've been giving you for two years. I said I don't really like those. Neil then gave his "old people" advice, "Just remember Ken after the age of 65

In January, Mr. Grant got a smart TV and for the very first time he now has access to YouTube. Let's remember he has no computer or cell phone so YouTube is completely brand new to him. Imagine all the possibilities. Right now he's loving getting caught up with the Whiskey Wednesday Show. During tonight's pre-warm up I heard him asking Barry to turn up his bass, lol.

always wear dark trousers." I'm going to leave this interpretation up to your imagination.



Back to the setlist, we are only at the third song of the evening. Ken, "Back to the **Clash**, listening to them the same time as the Ramones. This first song was not written by the Clash." They then did my all-time favorite "punk medley" of the traditional song that Ken refers to as "**Stranger**" into **Police On My Back** by the **Clash**. It really is a toe tapping, sing-along version that sounds great on the Gretsch. And nobody can beat Mr. Grants back ups, "What have I done."

I went on a deep dive research into the traditional "Stranger" song that they do. This tune is a part the **blue yodel** songs which are a series of thirteen songs written and recorded by **Jimmie Rodgers** during the period from 1927 to his death at the age of 33. The songs were based on the 12-bar blues format and featured Rodgers' trademark yodel refrains. Ken's "Stranger" is actually called "**Blue Yodel No. 7**." This now makes so much sense, I do love Ken's yodeling in this song. His version is very different from the original. Jimmie Rodgers was widely regarded as "the Father of Country Music."

The Clash were an English rock band formed in London in 1976 who were key players in the original wave of British punk rock. Billed as "The Only Band That Matters", they



also contributed to post-punk and new wave movements that emerged in the wake of punk and employed elements of a variety of genres including reggae, dub, funk, ska and rockabilly. Who doesn't love London Calling and Rock The Casbah.





Deep Thoughts by Ken Tizzard (Do readers remember Deep Thoughts on SNL?)

After returning back to the broadcast, after Part 1 of the John Pastore interview, Ken reflected, "After chatting with Johnny, Tavis, Kris and Dee, I could go back through them all but you get the idea. It's an incredible thing, it's just me talking to people. But we don't really talk about why people might tune in to see them. Me and John have yet to talk about Outer Battery Records aside from the name which led to a conversation of him growing up on the hill. I think that's the beauty of it for me anyways. I think it's neat to tune in to hear people talking about stuff that they don't talk about all the time." I'm so glad Ken brought this up. I totally agree, I love all the interesting places Ken goes in the interviews. You can always read their Wikipedia page for the facts. Ken makes it fun and interesting. This particular whatta ya at? was a challenge but I think I took a fun approach. The interview recap is coming up soon.

Ken could have stopped talking here, he continues. "Anyways, sorry I don't know what brought that on. A little awareness of my own, what do you call that (he can't think of the name)." All the Goats try to help, Neil, "past" Mr. Grant, "fable" Barry, "nostalgia" finally back to Ken, "No, no, it's a word, one of those things with letters in it and it represents a thought, a feeling, a place... I mean it's all those things, you guys are right on every level but it's not what I'm trying to say. And this could go on all night."

I really like the new "on air" neon sign that Barry got for the Studio.



Talking about Barry I liked this message chat. Joe asked, "Barry, what do you do during the interviews?" Debbie suggested, "Checking our messages" Barry replied to Debbie,



D.O.A. is known for its outspoken political opinions and has a history of performing for many causes and benefits. Its slogan is "Talk Minus Action Equals Zero."

"I do that all night." And to Joe,
"We all watch it together but I often
sneak out for a smoke and a pee."



Back to music. Ken, "This one goes out to Mike Buhler tonight. A little mellow **D.O.A.** for you Mike. We were going to play it a little faster but then I thought no Mike's here we are going to play it slow because I know that he would hate it slow (with a chuckle)." Then Ken went right into singing **The Enemy**. A song they do not play very often. Mike Buhler, a name regular viewers often hear on the Show approved, "And that was the song I was thinking of!" and after "Love it!" Later he posted, "Thanks buddy! Acoustic punk roc is funny as shit!"

This does not happen very often, Ken nearing the end of the song, still playing, "This is not at all the ending that I told you guys we were doing (with a big smile on)." The song ends and Ken explains what happened, "It's funny we do get a chance to jam these tunes before we play them. Usually in the 40 minutes before we go live we kind of knock an arrangement together. And I always give these guys arrangements that I then forget once I get to playing it. So apologies my boys, apologies." I agree with Neil we are all used to it, lol.

D.O.A. is a Canadian punk rock band from Vancouver. They are often referred to as being among the "founders" of hardcore punk.

And they are still at it, playing in their mid to late 60s.





Ken, "There is one song that we usually do and it's a great fun song with drums... We have a great version of it with Steve playing drums. ... For the punk rock boys from the pub here is a little **Blister In The Sun.**"

OK I'm going to take credit again not for the video, nothing to do with that, I just suggested playing it. I remember it was a highlight from last year's Show plus we get to see Steve and Mr. Grant playing bass. This song has fantastic bass lines and Mr. G grooved throughout the whole song and was so in the moment at the end they all stopped on cue and he kept going. You have to watch, it's priceless.





This whole video was so nostalgic. Ah the upstairs Studio, the mood lighting. I love Ken's reaction to Mr. G still playing and Steve getting ready for the final beat. Joe had a great comment, "Is it live...or Memorex?" This sounded familiar... I remember, it was an ad campaign for cassette recording tapes. Very good, very witty Joe.







Yes I came up with it. I love googling and using instagram captions, btw I have never used instagram, IoI. Ken continues, "I know there's a Waterboys tune that we are going to revisit, an Irish Rovers tune, Mr. Grant's favourite (you can

No introduction for the next song in the setlist just a dedication to Clark. Ken did a solo rendition of **Too Far Down** by **Hüsker Dü**. This song, the words, the message, amazing. I've never done this before I'm including the lyrics. I'm now regretting my lack of punk rock experience. Back in the day I was more of a Prince fan.

After this song, Ken, "One for Clarky, a Hüsker Dü song that we used to listen to all the time. Check out the Bob Mould version of that on the 12 string, it's beautiful, it's on Zen Arcade I believe. Great record. If you are going to start on Hüsker Dü and you are not familiar that's a good one. Candy Apple Grey is probably even better.

hear him say, "Oh God," Mr. Grant is not a fan of my theme nights, lol) and anything else Irish we can think of." A few more possibilities thrown out like U2 and Van Morrison. I am sure it will be a very entertaining evening.

Coming back "on air" from Part 2 of the guest interview video, for some reason these are always entertaining with Ken. Here's what happened this evening. I love hearing Barry in the background say "You're on" and then Ken, "And just like that we're back, and just like that there is an echo in the room, and just like that I'm reaching for the remote like every time and there goes the delay (pressing remote photo #1). You think I could, I have one technical job during the Show to do and that is push a button. And I can't get that right."

Then Mr. Grant had an interesting proposition, "You could delegate but I know you don't like to do that." Ken agreed, "I know, I know, I like to be in control of everything. Oh he knows me so well...






Barry has taken on 95% of the technical stuff, the only thing I have left to do is push this one button and plug in this one phone at the beginning of the Show. Other than that Barry has that all taken care for us, which is great. Remember when we used to do the Show, I had two mic's and I was mixing as we were playing and pressing on the iPad (photo #2) to do the switching between phones for cameras. Those were the days."

So very grateful for Barry. When the "on air" sign lights up Barry takes care of mixing the sound, switching between cameras all while keeping Ken on track and keeping an eye on the viewer comment board. Before the Show, Ken sets up the whole Broadcast Studio, the

technical soundcheck. And he also makes all the videos, interviews the guests, does all social media, and then of course writes original music. And let's not forget he does a wonderful job taking care of me.

Ken was not quite finished he had a one-liner to deliver, "What did you say Neil I just cut you off?" Neil, "That's quite all right, that's quite all right." Ken, "Ugh I'm going to pay for this now for three days (with a chuckle)." Neil, "No, at least four." I love their back-and-forth banter, again they're best friends.



I'm glad I captured this screenshot. Really what does go through Ken's mind, he makes this all up on the spot "live" during the Show.

For example, I saw an interview with Bryan Cranston earlier tonight. He was talking about how when they were wrapping up Breaking Bad he went for a hike in the mountains, parked his car, and his car had been broken into. And his briefcase was in the car and it contained the last two scripts for the season finale that they were shooting. And it was now in the public."

Ken fully committed to this next skit. He even made a special video the next day. Take it away Ken... "Lots of Watchmen rumors floating around out there. Big green squares appearing with dates on them. Everybody is relating them to shamrock day. Well let me tell you now here first. There are things in this world that sometimes you want to know and things that arrive at a time. And every now and again somebody who has the information accidentally spills the beans on something.





But as regard to the Watchmen, (building suspense) what the green square with the date on it means, <u>I can confirm 100%</u> on a date in the near future (viewers are waiting with anticipation) there will not be a Watchmen Irish record." And that's it he says no more. Mic drop!

Our viewers had some ideas. Richard, "Give Ken another whiskey and toke. Maybe he will spill the beans." Tony then suggested, "Make it happen uncle Neil!"

Coincidentally we are watching Breaking Bad now, 3rd time for Ken, 2nd for me, 1st for Neil. Routinely after dinner most nights the three of us watch one or two episodes of a show.

Ken continues, "Sometimes things spill. There is a guy named Sammy Kohn, who I love very much, if you think I am a control freak, you're right.

After the Watchmen skit it was back to music. Ken, "This is a song by the **Pixies**. it is called **Here Comes Your Man**."

Pixies is an American band formed in 1986, in Boston. Pixies are associated with the 1990s alternative rock boom, and draws on elements including punk rock and surf rock. Their music is known for dynamic "loud-quiet-loud" shifts and song structures. The band achieved modest popularity in the US but was more successful in Europe.



Pixies' popularity grew in the years after their breakup, leading to a 2004 reunion, four further albums (latest 2022) and they are still touring today.





After they finished the Pixies song (with an Elvis Costello ending) we were right back into the Watchmen when this viewers comment caught Ken's attention. Niall asked, "Will the Gretch work with the Watchman sound?" This turned into a really interesting reflection.

Ken, "You know Niall I have had that question a lot, why don't we do Watchmen covers. And that's not the question you asked. But to answer your question in a roundabout way. We did a version of Kill The Day that was actually kind of fun to play." Jeannie the regular viewer who originally requested this song commented, "Kill the day was excellent."

He continues, "The problem I have with Watchmen and Thornley, stuff that I have been involved with where I was a part of the process of it coming to fruition, developing all the parts, watching every musician working meticulously getting exactly the part and the sound down over months and years and then playing them for decades after.

And hearing them exactly a certain way. I know where Sammy's hands are when I am faced away from him in the middle of a roll, I know what he is doing. Same with Joey and Danny. It was like that with Sekou and Ian. Those were great moments. But I feel they are so ingrained in me to try to take them and break them down and to reconstruct them." I love listening and watching Ken when he is in the moment reminiscing. He especially loved demonstrating Sammy's drumming, lol.

"When I do my own stuff it's easy...When I do a cover song, I kind of deconstruct it but I am deconstructing it after the process is done. I don't have the knowledge that the people in the band had, or have right now. I am coming at it new, just as a song that I like and appreciate.

But to do that after I have already done the other process with other people it seems impossible to me. We managed to do Kill The Day because that was a song that in all honesty I think Joey brought that one in finished. So there was not much of a writing process and it was kind of recorded as an acoustic song until the drums and bass come in on the bridge because hey our egos needed to be fed as well (Ken always has to have a one-liner). The song stands beautifully as it is so that was one that I could actually tackle and pull a part.







But to do a version of All Uncovered (please do, my favorite Watchmen song) or something, for me it's too in my mind... It's like putting bad code into a computer." Ken finally answers the question, "So yes this guitar would sound great with the Watchmen. But it would have to be with Joey playing it and the rest of the Watchmen around. Joey would make this guitar sound amazing." I liked one viewers, Jordon's suggestion, "Stereo would sound killer with an Irish accent."

How to wrap up, with a "new word of the week" from Neil of course. I shall explain. Ken, "Joey's got his new EVH that he loves (yes Ken says "h" in a uniquely Newfy way, Iol). His Eddie Van Halen custom. He loves that thing. It's actually a forking beautiful guitar." Neil comments, "It's titchy." They both go on to describe more of this guitar, you'll have to tune in to watch.

Word Of The Week- titchy (adjective)-British slang very small; tiny

I like the black & white effect when Ken reposted their version.

We are now at the final song of the evening. Ken with the big build up, "I have been trying to work out a version of this... Are we doing this in E or F? (directed to Mr. Grant, the keeper of keys). So this is a song that I have been working on for a long time. I have researched it, I have listened to all these recordings of it by different bands. I had a really hard time getting it together... left it for a while, came back to it, same thing wasn't happening... And then, I think about two weeks ago we were doing a Show, Sammy Kohn, oh it was the All Request Night. You know when I do All Request Night, it's usually requests in advance, so songs that I kind of know already. There's a long list, a couple hundred songs... This was Sammy and he requested the **Ace Of Spades**... It was



just on Monday night when we were rehearsing and I said let's put an arrangement of this together. This is what we came up with, it's a nice little tribute to Lemmy. I don't know if he would like it or not, he seemed like a nice guy."



What a fantastic way to end the punk rock episode. Jordan's comment summed up the evening, "Loving these punk songs done Goat style!" I enjoyed writing my band retrospective essay.

Motörhead were an English rock band formed in London in 1975 by Lemmy (lead vocals, bass), Larry Wallis (guitar) and Lucas Fox (drums). Lemmy was also the primary songwriter and only constant member. Most often classified as heavy metal, they have been credited with being part of and influencing numerous musical scenes, metal and speed metal especially. Lemmy, however, always insisted that they were a rock and roll band. He said that they had more in common with punk bands, but with their own unique sound, Motörhead is embraced in both punk and metal scenes.

And there you go I always thought Motörhead was heavy metal. It was a perfect ending for this evening's Whiskey Wednesday Show.

Ken, "So as all of you know Steve was diagnosed last December with cancer and he went through all the treatments, surgeries, changed his entire life style, made all the sacrifices he had to. It was an incredibly hard year. In the fall after his last surgery he actually came back to Newfoundland... he had a great time, lots of energy. And this kept going up until a few weeks ago. He has been back to the doctor and his cancer has returned. According to the doctors, using the medicines that we have they don't have a very good prognosis. There is a gofundme set up they are looking to do some alternate treatments...We are wishing Steve all the best, we are sending him nothing but positivity."

Ken introduces the first song of the evening, "We figured we would try to knock out some of these tunes we don't do. Some of them I like. Some of them are just kind of as

I enjoyed researching the bands in the punk episode so I thought why not do that again. Have you figured out this will become a regular feature in the magazine for cover songs. Dylan and Hynes are very familiar to viewers.



A band I was not familiar with, I learned a lot. The **Irish Rovers** is a group of Irish musicians that originated in Toronto, Canada. Formed in 1963 and they're still playing! They are best known for their international television series, contributing to the popularization of Irish Music in North America

In the early 1980s, the group adjusted its style and began aiming itself towards the country-rock field. Renamed **The Rovers**, the group scored a major international hit with "**Wasn't That a Party"** and also found success with their version of "Grandma Got Run Over By a Reindeer" who doesn't love

this classic Christmas song! Now that I'm thinking about it, this song would be great done in the Goats style. You're welcome Mr. Grant, Io!!

Storytime with Ken

Then Ken starts telling a story while strumming his guitar. It feels like we are around a campfire or we're sitting down for storytime, lol. I love it! Ken, "I remember this song when I was hanging out on 12 Malta Street. My Uncle Kitch would pick me up every Saturday and we would go to Woolco out at the Avalon mall. He would get his prescriptions filled for the week, his block of cheese and some beer. We would go back to 12 Malta Street where Kitch, Sally, Suze, Gert, Barb, Donna, young Kitch, who else... there was also my grandmother and great grandmother (all living in the same single story house with a basement)."

Back to Ken's vivid memories, "They had one phone (line) in the house. If you called and they answered it downstairs and if it was for upstairs, there was a broom next to it so you would knock on the ceiling."

Neil slipped in a one-liner dad joke, "Too bad they didn't have a daughter they could've called her Kitch-Annette." Ken, "They had a bunch of daughters there was a whole clan in there, four or five generations. Uncle Kitch was a great guy, he treated me very well... At Woolco he would let me pick out a toy, a puzzle, a G.I. Joe and

I would go back to Malta street and spend the day playing with it... I mostly remember spending time up in that tree, an old dogwood tree out in the back, it's been torn down apparently. I used to live in that tree...

I remember when this album was popular, or was it seasonal... They would always break out this song (Wasn't That A Party) this is where I remember it from out on Malta Street."

Now it was time for a Longtooth beer commercial and an announcement, "I'm going to open the Hastings County Light... It's a 3.6, it's a light beer. I don't know if that means it's light in colour, light in alcohol or light in flavour, let me see (oh the anticipation as you hear him crack open the can and take a gulp). It goes down like water. It's like many light beers but it has a taste though. A kind of citrusy taste." Later in the Show Ken announced, "We are talking about maybe doing some kind of Goat beer or Wednesday beer." TBD

Ken had a few from the heart, open and vulnerable "Deep Thoughts" this evening. While introducing the next song he had his first, "Ron Hynes always needs to be mentioned especially on a Whiskey Wednesday when we're talking about Irish things... I think we will do two Ron Hynes maybe even three, we will see how the night goes.

I'm in a weird state of mind. I've been sleeping forked up, bad dreams. I've talked about my medication and depression and all that stuff in the past. It's a delicate balance at the best of time. With what's been going on in the world around me, a proximity of a few kilometers, it's been a really heavy couple of months and that has made me think about things a lot. One of the things that I concluded was that I really enjoy these Wednesday nights hanging out with you guys, playing music with my friends."

Ken's words resonated with viewers, lots of comments, here's a few, "We really enjoy these Wednesday nights. Changed my life in a way," to a chorus of "mine too," "me three," "ditto," and "If I'm struggling in the head, I throw on a ww podcast and it makes my day!" I told you the podcasts are enjoyable and apparently therapeutic.

Then it was time for the first of three Ron Hynes songs this evening. Ken, "This is a song **Ron Hynes** wrote about the Newfoundland migration to New York during the turn of the century. Migrant workers looking to lay steel and concrete." They then played **For The USA.**

I got a little anxious with his banter after this song. Ken, "All those Irish and Newfoundland steel workers down in the harbors of New York putting up bridges, laying concrete, cheating on their wives, getting people pregnant, suddenly having kids in two countries. Sometimes that happened, not all of them. I don't think contraception was a big thing back then." Neil added, "Especially for the Irish." Ken wonders, "I don't know, is that true, are the Irish more 'uncontraceptive' (made up word)." Neil added, "Irish Catholics." I was worried what Ken would say next. You should never talk religion or politics, and when you mention Irish you are definitely in both categories.

Instead Ken went in a different direction, "It's hard to be out cheating like that you know. It's not like that anymore, that stuff gets all discussed online with your Tinder hook up. You talk about everything you need for the night, day, morning, hour or whatever time it happens to be."



Lunch atop a Skyscraper is a black-and-white photograph taken in 1932, of eleven ironworkers sitting on a steel beam 850 feet (260 meters) above the ground on the sixty-ninth floor of the RCA Building in Manhattan. It was arranged as publicity for promoting the skyscraper. Local folklore states that many of the individuals pictured in this photograph, are Newfoundlanders from towns in Conception Bay.

Men called "Fish" were Newfoundlanders who over the decades have headed to New York City to help build that city's incredible skyline. American construction companies needed workers who were not afraid of heights. The Newfoundland fisherman were used to climbing the high rigging on fishing schooners and weren't afraid of working on high steel. Sons followed their fathers: the risk was high, but so was the pay. Fish helped build the Twin Towers.

Reading a viewer comment inspired Ken's second "Deep Thought", "Well thanks Joe the Wednesday nights have changed your life in a way. Yeah I know, it's strange isn't it. I have been doing a lot of contemplating on the arc of music that I have been involved with and how I have related it to people. This is by far one of the oddest but it was born out of necessity. Often for the creative mind put into a 'strugguless' (also a made up word) place you will create something interesting and new. That's kind of what happened here."

Neil took over the mic and spoke directly to Joe one of our regular viewers. Joe had offered Neil to use his Garrison Gibson at an upcoming show. "Joe I apologize you posted and offered to let me play it when we are in Picton next weekend. I would love to see the guitar but I am absolutely petrified of the idea of using somebody else's guitar on stage. Bring it so we can go oh and ah."

I'm thinking the Gibson will make an appearance Joe asked Barry, "I'll need to know when the band will be setting up in Picton so I can get the Gibson there for sound check etc." I will let you know what happens.

This was a first Ken started introducing a song that comes near the end of the Show. "We're working on a Waterboys song to play for you tonight, which we will. That will be cool, I'm looking forward to it. It's in a key that puts me right at the top of my register for singing... A lot of those high screaming singers I just can't do that stuff. I can barely get out of talking. This one puts me right at the top of my register and it keeps me there for the whole song."

This led into a Ken revelation that may explain why tonight's Show felt a little different. "In preparation for that song I thought I won't smoke any drugs today (don't be alarmed he had an alternative). I'll give my voice a break until after I sing that song. So I had to take a bunch of edibles earlier tonight to kind of get in the mood. I thought I will start with 25 ml, I'll cut it in four, I'll stagger it. I'm just waiting for it to roll on in here. Not that you guys aren't enough to make me happy." Nice come back! We will check in later to see how Ken's "high" is coming along.



I found this on Joe's Facebook page. I love FB even though I have never ever posted on it. Joe replying to a comment, "This is actually a Canadian built Gibson. There aren't too many left around. They were built in St John's, NF. If you ever come across one, grab it."

It was almost time for the next song. Ken, "We are going to play **Stiff Little Fingers** for you know another great Irish band. We played this last week as part of the punk show. As much as I have enjoyed playing all these covers this month, with Valentine's Day, the punk day and this the green day it's been a lot of learning tunes that aren't ours. I'm looking forward to getting back to some of the new album stuff. We should have a single coming out your way within the next two months." All the covers, that's partly my fault, OK well maybe all my fault. We have reflected and we think it's important to keep challenging ourselves.

Stiff Little Fingers band bio was covered in the punk section. Again the lyrics in these punk songs are really good. I really like **Wasted Life** and I'm going to vote for it to be in their more regular rotation.

After this song, Ken had a lovely one-sided chat with Llew during which he made an announcement, "The newsletter is now a magazine and I am actually working with a printer to see if we could get printed copies every month." Yes we are "in talks" I'm not quite sure what we will do with the printed magazines but it's very exciting. We laugh, the trend is 3 minute TikTok's videos and I'm doing the opposite 100+ page magazines if you want.

It only took Ken a half an hour to mention the theme name of tonight's Show and then when he did it revealed something quite surprising. Ken sets up his skits so well. "Have I mentioned that we are ShamRockin' & Rollin' tonight Neil?" He replies, "No you have not. I'm glad you finally did." Ken knows full well he hasn't. Now he brings Barry into his build up "What do you think there Barry?" He replies, "I love it." Thank you Goats for being so supportive of my themes. It's at this point I realize what Ken forgot to do. Some background, we share what's coming up on next week's Show.



Ken continues, "All day Allison is like have you done the 'next week' thing, yes of course, I hadn't. In the afternoon have you done 'next weeks,' yes of course, I hadn't because it's the last thing I do. Tonight she said to me have you done next week's?" Now he comes up with his excuse. "I remember last week it felt so great to type up ShamRockin' & Rollin' tonight I didn't do it (finally admits he forgot). So now if Barry pushes the button it will say we are ShamRockin' & Rollin.' Which maybe we should see again anyways Barry. I just love the way ShamRockin' & Rollin' looks.

Hey look at that, ShamRockin' & Rollin,' Allison is so great for coming up with that one."

Ken is not done and now he looks confused, "But next week is umm is it all request Allison? (he is yelling to me) I'm totally after forgetting, how could I forget?" Yes how could he forget, do you see what I'm dealing with, lol. You can hear me shouting from my bedroom loft, "Anniversary."

Really how could I get mad after that lead up. He's correct I must ask him at least three times every Wednesday. Not to worry by the end of the Show I had a plan. Let me explain our "before" Show routine.

We really are creatures of habit. Ken cooks dinner six days a week and always has Wednesday's off. Neil picks up dinner at 5:30. Not a lot of choices in town, Antonia's is by far our favourite. After dinner Ken goes for his shower. If it's a hair washing day he comes out looking like a 53 year old Fabio with his "mullet" hair flowing, lol. At 7 o'clock the rest of the Goats arrive and they do a soundcheck. Now to my plan. I have asked Barry to check that the "Next Week" slide has been updated. What would we do without Barry.

Lots of Ken and Neil one-liners for the next song. Ken, "Not looking forward to this one Jeannie...I always have to blame Jeannie for this one. I don't think she's here tonight." Barry who always keeps an eye on the comments let Ken know she was watching, "Hee Hee Of course I'm here!!" Ken is not in the habit of 'calling out' viewers, she's the one that originally requested this song.



Ken did a fantastic job describing using hand gestures.

Neil was ready for his one-liner pun, "So now You2 are going to do it."

The Gretch with Edge's syncopated sound on **U2's Bad** is very special. Jeannie enjoyed, "Why thank you kind sir." and "Your version is always wonderful."

After the song came the funniest skit of the evening, for me anyways. Ken, "Bono just had that way of singing. It's great every time I learn these old tunes I go back and watch a bunch of videos, it's a part of my process. I was watching the Live Aid stuff today, Bono's hair, MISTAKE. At the time I remember watching it thinking he's so cool with that hair. Watching it now it's like two separate haircuts. On the top he's got this punky poofy thing going on. And then there is a visible spot where the mullet starts... There's a side angle that makes it look like that. From the front he looks cool... not that I can talk, look at this (pointing to his own hair)." Neil jumped on the opportunity to point out Ken's missing the top part to which Ken replied, "I have the Bono haircut without part A, I just got the part B (the mullet)."

Back to Ken's introduction, "I played this the first time and thought that's good I finally did a U2 song I never need to do another

U2 are an Irish rock band from Dublin, Ireland formed in 1976. Way too much to share about this band. So instead let's talk about Live Aid.



Live Aid, benefit concert (\$127 million for Famine Relief in Africa) held simultaneously at Wembley Stadium in London (72,000 people attended) and JFK Stadium in Philadelphia (89,484 people) on July 13, 1985 (37 years ago). It was one of the largest satellite link-ups and television broadcasts of all time; an estimated audience of 1.9 billion, in 150 nations, watched the live broadcast, nearly 40 percent of the world population.

Perhaps the most noteworthy performances belonged to—U2 and Queen — U2 devoted 12 minutes of its allotted time to its anthem "Bad," and lead singer Freddie Mercury powered through a condensed set of Queen's greatest hits. Groups reuniting for the event included the Who, Black Sabbath, and Crosby, Stills, Nash, and Young. The surviving members of Led Zeppelin reconvened in Philadelphia, supported by Phil Collins on drums. Collins, who had performed at Wembley earlier in the day, had crossed the Atlantic on the Concord to become the only artist to appear on both Live Aid stages.

The concert closed with "Do They Know It's Christmas?" (in London) and "We Are the World" (in Philadelphia). I was watching, were you?

John hasn't fully retired, he's a school bus driver. I'm sure he is loved by the kids. When Ken mentions a viewer I will try to give background information.

Ken then introduces the next song, "We are going to do a little **Sonny's Dream** for you if that's all right with everybody?" Neil replied, "sure" however they weren't done with the hair stories. Neil started, "I had a friend many years ago who was quite bald, he was in his mid-30s. And his line was God gives us all a certain amount of hormones and if you want to waste yours growing hair go right ahead." I wasn't sure what this meant, here's Ken's theory, "So he was using his hormones to maintain erections." Neil suggested, "I don't know why. I think he was growing hair on his palms... You never did see him at full moon." I'm still very confused, lol.

This inspired Ken to share another hair story, "I had a buddy named Rick Rouah when growing up... I remember in grade 4 he started getting body hair, he was a very hairy guy." Back to Neil but they are moving away from hair, "I had a couple of guys, mind you they were in grade 8 and were like 16, 17 and 18. We had one guy who drove his car to industrial arts which was in another school when we were in grade 6." Now that's insane.

Back to Ken for a story that I've never quite heard this way before. So I can't fact check it, lol. Ken, "I remember going from grade 6 to grade 7. In Newfoundland it was 1 through 6, 7 through 9, 10 up to 13 depending on what year you went in the 80s... I remember making the transition from grade school to middle school. Grade school was still marbles in the parking lot at recess... I show up the first day of grade 7, it's only three months after I left grade 6 and I am walking in, I got pregnant girls in my class. The summer between grade 6 and 7 I discovered a little bit of drugs. I happened to have a little bit of hash on the first day of grade 7, somebody was looking for some, I had a little bit, a little dime piece. So suddenly I was just like (Neil suggested "the dealer") I was the guy to get drugs from.

> which Debbie replied, "I knew it!" I would say definitely the gummy's were working. We're only at the fifth song and I'm averaging one page per song. Ken is very talkative this evening. They then played viewer fave Sonny's Dream by Ron Hynes.




After the song Ken was a little defensive, IoI, "A little Ron Hynes to bring you back home, Sonny's Dream. Irish tune, well the forking Irish think they own it. As close to an Irish tune

it would be fun to learn about "the song." Sonny's Dream, written by Newfoundlander Ron Hynes in 1976. It tells the story of a man who wishes to fulfill his dreams, but is bound to his rural homeland by his family, particularly his lonely mother. Hynes wrote the song while on a roadtrip with his band in western Canada and based it on his uncle, Thomas "Sonny" O'Neill, who had taught him how to play guitar and had pushed him to play music professionally. First recorded by The Wonderful Grand Band. It has been covered by many artists, including Great big sea, Emmylou Harris, Valdy, Corey Hart and Ken Tizzard with Music for Goats.

Ken shares so much about "the man" with viewers. I thought that you are going to get but it ain't actually an Irish tune it's a Newfoundland tune. Ron Hynes, Ferryland Newfoundland wrote that song. Irish take credit for it." He's not actually angry he's more passionate. He's explained that it's been covered so often in Ireland they feel it's theirs. When it comes on in a pub people stand and sing-along.

Van Morrison, is a Northern Irish singer-songwriter and multi-instrumentalist whose recording career spans seven decades. At the age of 77 he is still out touring.

It was then time for tonight's Microphone Shootout, in the spotlight was a ribbon microphone. Ken had an in-depth, very interesting review. More information in Gear Talk. This led directly into, Ken, "We still have some interesting songs coming up," which led into **Brown Eyed Girl** by **Van Morrison**.

Brown Eyed Girl was written by Morrison and recorded in 1967. It is considered to be Van Morrison's signature song. As of 2015, "Brown Eyed Girl" remains the most downloaded and most played song of the entire 1960s decade.

After the song, Ken, "Ah you're getting in trouble there Tony, the wife is getting mad at him for singing out too loud." I agree you have to sing along to Brown Eyed Girl. Viewers agreed, "Ohhh great...now I'm singing along," "Yup us too!," "I can almost hear you, Joe." and Tony's, "Wife giving me the gears for singing so loud and proud."

I'm just taking this as an opportunity to share a photo and it was my second "shout out" this evening. Ken referring to a viewers comment, "Tulips up yet? You know something they are (they are not up, lol). Allison got some tulips from Dahlia May...for Women's Day. Is that the yellow ones, are they tulips?" I yelled out to him, they are daffodils.

Ken did a wonderful job thanking viewers, "And Niall it reminded me. So I know I do this donate thing every week, I put it up. It's an automatic thing that happens in the background. Every now and again I look and see oh these people have sent me some money, it's really cool. I don't send out messages thanking people all the time, some people have a monthly subscription...We appreciate everything you send through. I noticed the other day, I opened my phone, that balance looked weird, oh Niall dropped me a nice chunk of money. Oh cool that's going to help out with things. So thank you Niall and everybody that helps out with the Show. We run here like a college or independent radio station." We really do appreciate everybody's generosity.

Ken, "The **Waterboys**... Next month you will know more about the Waterboys because Allison will write all about it. Probably write more information than I know about them. Years later, still love this band."

They then started playing **Whole of the Moon**, Ken stopped as he was starting to sing the third verse, "We are going to start this again Neil. I sort of started thinking about things (took a moment to gather his thoughts). It's been the weirdest six weeks since Steve's cancer came back. It's just been so incredibly sad. Sorry I wasn't going to talk about this tonight. He takes over my head sometimes. I am very aware of what he is going through and the family is going through... Sometimes I can get away from the brain, music is usually a good way to do it but it has been hard these past six weeks. Tonight is especially weird I keep having these really strong thoughts about it all. Sorry folks, I've been a little aloof, we are going to try this song again to see if I can get back on track. Sending out our best to Steve."



Ken was able to get through, what a heartwarming, inspiring rendition. The song ended with Neil saying, "Whoops" a couple of wrong notes played. Ken replied, "That's OK, heavy weights all around, heavy weights all around. We will capture a good version of that one day." "My meditation" is working on him, lol, such a positive attitude, and we do not have to wait very long.

Who is Mike Scott? He is the founding member, lead singer, guitarist and songwriter of rock band The Waterboys. Also still at it, at the age of 64.





The Waterboys are a Scottish folk rock band formed in Edinburgh in 1983 by musician Mike Scott. OK I know you're saying to yourself this is Irish night. Yes Ken knows his geography. The band's membership, past and present, have been composed mainly of musicians from Scotland, Ireland, Wales and England. I looked at the list of former members, I'm not exaggerating there were 80 names (I wonder which guitar player reached out to Ken, so many options, IoI.) Mike Scott has remained the only constant member throughout the band's career.

No banter right into the next song or did they? Ken, "Ah this is one for my daughters. Watchmen...This is a great record. I was asking Johnny particularly what music an old punker like myself would like and he sent me this. And I absolutely love it, it was a really good choice."

Talking about great choices, Ken went record shopping.

(#4) Ken, "I grabbed this record, I used to like this record, it was only seven bucks... I got it home and put it on and I forgotten how forking amazing this record is. Front to back every song is a smash. The playing is so tight... It's by a guy named **Joe Jackson** (British) an artist from the 80s and 90s. The album is called Look Sharp! (1979)." No exaggerating here, I wholeheartedly agree!





We are almost at the song, Ken had another viewer "shout out." "Oh Grace Price, nice to see you Grace, hope you are doing well love." We met Grace 25+ years ago at the Toronto Island Marina. Are you curious? You don't have to wait long to find out. More coming up in the magazine.

One Direction became the first band in the US Billboard 200 history to have their first four albums debut at number one. Their third album, Midnight Memories, was the best-selling album worldwide of 2013 and in support of this album had the highest-grossing concert tour in 2014, the highest-grossing tour by a vocal group in history, and the 15th highest-grossing concert tour of all time. As of 2020, the band have sold a total of 70 million records worldwide, making them one of the best-selling boy bands of all time. I could go on and on but you get the idea. And I must admit I'm a fan of Harry Styles too!



I had to think out of the box for this one. I could not find anything about the Ron Hynes song so instead...

Old Perlican is a fishing village on the Avalon Peninsula, 2hrs from St. Johns's. Settled in 1640 and incorporated in 1971.

It is one of the oldest fishing communities in Newfoundland.

The "old" was added to distinguish it from New Perlican further up the bay.

In the 2021 census Old Perlican had a population of 608 living in 253 of its 316 total private dwellings.

When reading this with Ken, he thought I bet you can get a house there cheap. I checked, nope, \$99,900 the average.



The Show has come to an end. Ken still does not have a closing tagline. Our viewers have made up their own and I will explain the history behind it, using tonight's chat.

At the end of every episode Joe posts, "#tpwk" tonight he added (treat people with kindness). Barry replied, "Every week you post that and I've wondered what it meant." Tony added, "Ww closing thoughts/slogan/whatever you want to call it." and "Staple!" Joe then clarified, "#tpwk came from Caitlyn. Just sayin."

Yes Joe is correct, when Caitlyn used to be the Show producer (before Barry) she would say that because guess who had a song named Treat People With Kindness? Harry Styles of course! I agree with Tony it has become a staple, we regulars have become very use to seeing this.

This is one of Whiskey Wednesday Show's shortest setlist. I'm going to quickly explain why. The whole Show came in at 1 hour and 31 minutes which is average. So now you're wondering why, Ken was solo and only played six songs. The anniversary video is 40 minutes long so really a mini documentary. It's very entertaining. You may want to top up your drink or get a snack at that point, lol. And then of course we have Ken who loves to talk to an audience of iPhones.

Ken introduces the evening in his own unique way, "Three year anniversary, how do you say anniversary? I say anniversary by staying by myself. Removing most

of the people who are usually around me and enjoying some time by myself, solitude, a little reflective thinking. Because that's what anniversaries are about.' Ken actually does do a lot of reflecting however here's the real reason he is alone, "Forking Covid has been in the camp for the past two weeks, that's the long and the short of it." After the Covid update we get to music.

Ken, "I'm going to play a bunch of songs tonight that I don't usually play and I'm going to play them all in the wrong keys (yes he's going to miss Mr. Grant the key keeper)... This is a really old song... called **Where Were You** that I put out on an album called Quiet Story House." Regulars know this as the mystery song. After, "Where were you, that's an old song that I wrote for a very good friend when I realized things were a little one sided perhaps, and I will leave it at that."




This was Ken being dramatic, however I am grateful for masks, knock on wood, I'm still symptomless.

Before we get to the next song I will address Ken's teasing. For the past couple of weeks he has been mentioning a new guitar. Ken, "Trying to decide which guitar to play today. The Gibson, or the Martin or the Gretch or the new one. I thought maybe I will spring the new one on them tonight. I went no, no I was supposed to do that last week and that didn't happen... The new one is going to have to wait for the right time and the right place." Yes I can confirm he definitely does have a new guitar. You get two hints, it's an electric guitar in a unique colour.



The Broadcast Studio looks so empty with just Ken and Barry. As you can see Ken went with the Martin tonight.



Slaid Cleaves is an American singer-songwriter born in Washington, D.C. from his website... "Grew up in Maine. Lives in Texas. Writes songs. Makes records. Travels around. Tries to be good. Joseph Hudak of Rolling Stone calls Cleaves "a master storyteller, one influenced not by the shine of pop-culture but by the dirt of real life." Slaid's not much into social media. You can reach him on Twitter or on the Contact page of this site."

In 2000, Cleaves had an Americana charts hit with his album **Broke Down** and song of the same name.



We are already at the second song of the evening. Ken, "You all know I am a huge **Slaid Cleaves** fan. He put out a new album last week, well I got it last week. It's as good as ever. I'm trying to remember the name of it now and I can't. I'll get some information on it for next week (you don't have to wait, lol) because it's beautiful, it's a really nice record. This is an old Slaid Cleaves song, this is the song that got me into Slaid a long time ago."

Ken then played **Broke Down** which ties with my other favourite Slaid song, Green Mountains and Me. Ken always does great versions. I think their vocals are similar and they are both strong narrative storytellers.

After the song, "A little Slaid Cleaves for you all. The new album is great, great songs and stories. One in particular, 'he was a great criminal, a bad citizen and an even worse husband and father' or something like that are the lyrics. He spins these words together so well. Sorry I know those aren't the actual lyrics. It's something like that. He tells these great stories. Slaid Cleaves check him out if you haven't heard of him."

I'm going to share my own Slaid Cleaves somewhat "related" story. I'm going to

take you back to October 2014. Ken and I traveled to Syracuse NY to watch Slaid Cleaves perform for the first time for both of us. We were huge fans, the show was fantastic.

This weekend was very significant. You know when they say a moment changes your life forever, this was ours. This was the week that I experienced my first MS symptom. The girls and I walked to school most days and I was experiencing what I now know is "foot drop." My left leg would drag.

Seven months of testing, seeing specialists with the final diagnosis of MS in May of 2015. Crazy to think I'm coming up to eight years.

Ken, "A song I have not played in a long time. Frank Meyers is a farmer down Trenton way. Years back the country approached him to buy his land because Trenton airbase was expanding. He said no thanks I'm a farmer here. I've been farming my whole life, my dad farmed, my grandpa farmed. My grandpa, my dad built this house, and all those barns out there that you see. We are still an active farm, we make food for the community. And the government said I don't think you understand we would like your land. We'll give you fair market value for it. And Frank said no me and my wife live here, I'm 86 years old I don't want to leave. This started a massive battle, legal and political, in the way that the media politicizes things. Lots of support groups trying to help him out.

Ken put together a lovely video starring Frank Meyers himself. I'd love to show you more images from it but I'm going to save them for when the video is shown on one of these Whiskey Wednesday nights.



I saw him on TV one morning, I had been following the story for a while from a distance. You know local farmer being runoff his land type of thing. By the time I had really clued in they had parceled off a little piece of his land with the house on it. They eventually came in and took the land from him, bulldozed the barns that his grandparents had built. Frank did not win that war. I got to meet with him, chat with him, a really nice guy. I wrote this song not out of any political (Ken did not finish his thought), it was just something that moved me. Seeing Frank tear up about not being able to keep his land was something I couldn't ignore. This is a song called **Mud On My Boots**."

An excellent example of Ken's narrative songwriting style. I picture Frank every time I hear this song.

There was a lot of articles to comb through, here's the Cole's notes... Frank Meyers was one of numerous local landowners being forced off their properties to accommodate the planned expansion of CFB Trenton, the country's largest and busiest air force base. But while most neighbours eventually reached a deal with the federal government, Meyers vowed to never leave his beloved farm, no matter how much money Ottawa offered to pay. As he famously proclaimed (more than once): "What are they going to do, send a task force in to take me out?"

Meyers's tough stance didn't garner much local sympathy. Political leaders championed the arrival of JTF-2 because the air-base expansion will inject millions of federal dollars and hundreds of well-paying jobs into an economically depressed region. "The good of the many, in this particular case, outweighs the good of the few."

The Meyers land is more than just a dairy farm. It's a slice of Ontario heritage. The direct descendant of Capt. John Walden Meyers—a loyalist war hero and founder of nearby Belleville—

Frank farmed a portion of the very same plot of land bestowed on his famous forefather by King George III for his exemplary service during the American Revolution. Signed in 1798, nearly 70 years before Canadian Confederation, the Crown land patent assigned the property to the Meyers clan "forever."

Meyers had been dreading this moment for eight long years, since the day a federal bureaucrat first knocked on his door to ask if he was willing to sell his land. Eight years later, in May 2014, the teardown finally began. Frank was 86. He passed away in 2019 at the age of 91.



A viewer shared, "My aunt, uncle and cousins lived just north of the air force base and after renovating a beautiful old farmhouse had it expropriated along with Frank. Beauty song."



Just before we get to the anniversary video Ken's camera was acting up again. For new viewers, we are upgrading from iPhones to cameras in the Broadcast Studio. This one camera can move with hand gestures and if Ken forgets to turn this option off, the camera has a mind of its own. I am sure you are gathering he often forgets which is fine because his reactions are hilarious when it happens.



As the camera moves in for a close-up, "Oh what's it doing now. Hi, stop that, go away."



"Go away, go back" Ken is using his left hand, not the universal sign for "loser" it is one of the hand gestures to move the camera.



Ken tries his right hand, "No it's this one. There you go, go back, go back further. No the other way." It's a work in progress!

I love our *Inniversary Video*. Part One documents the first two years of virtual Whiskey Wednesday and the second part highlights the various guests we had on when we officially became the Whiskey Wednesday Show. I think it's a fabulous video with so many images, stories, memories I could probably write 20 pages just on this video. I am showing restraint and I challenged myself to summarize and write succinctly. This will be difficult, I can do it! I did get it down to 7, really there's lots of photos. Ken does his reflecting after the video.

Whistling, ""Is there anybody out there?" People did watch and it grew weekly. Many regulars are still with us.



"I appreciate those of you who are not out mowing the lawn." and "At the park I hope you got out early to claim your park circle." Covid times were very, very interesting and strange.

Joe commented, "During Covid lockdown WW was a life saver!

The first virtual Whiskey Wednesday was on March 25th, 2020, the week the world changed. Now three years later, personally I feel like I can finally really reflect on that time. Virtual Whiskey Wednesday was a huge part of getting through. It was literally Ken, a couch, a guitar and an iPhone for what seemed like months. You can imagine the stories we enjoyed. His Covid Chatter was particularly entertaining.

"We are all in a bad place, your true friends they will be there for you forever and for always."

"I'm really happy to have my girls home... if you can find any silver linings please embrace them."

Kept me sane... we sane... and grounded." Richard added, "Happy 3rd year anniversary. Remember tuning into those first few COVID shows. Ken and iPhone. Ron shared, "I missed the 1st year..." It feels like you've been here since the beginning, lol.



Ken definitely had pandemic lockdown hysteria, here is one interesting perspective. "Most of my day, bed, chair, coffee, chair, bed, coffee, back-and-forth. Day and night now. It's a new adaptive cycle that I am working on. Instead of a 24 hour

day it's the three hour mini day. And there are 8 of them in a day plus 1 hour of free time which isn't part of

the day..." He keeps talking gibberish but wisely stopped at this point and moved on to the next video segment. I still have no clue what he was saying. However, I think everyone can relate to how time moved during the pandemic. It did seem like each day, each week, each month and each year just morphed into one another.



As we were moving through the first, second, third etc. waves and carefully navigating pandemic rules Ken welcomed the Goats to join in on Wednesday nights.



I'm going to use images to show you how Mr. Grant and Neil react to a classic Ken story. Remember they have no idea what he is going to say. I'm not even sure Ken knows what he's going to say.

It's hard to tell in the photo but in the video you can see sitting does not prevent Ken from still getting into his groove.






A couple of differences: Ken is trying a new position sitting in front, he



"I think it's fascinating that I can sit in almost the exact same spot that Cassidy was birthed, like right here, this is where our bed used to be." Ken often tells this story, now you have a visual.







"I look forward to the night when we can share a plate of nachos again. And we could both be coughing on it while reaching in with our grubby hands." Not likely, lol.

Ken describes sharing a plate of nachos pre-Covid at the pub.

You have to watch, his top

three quotes...

"It's 1am at the pub, everybody's drunk and you order nachos. Nobody asks, it arrives in front of you, there's 10 hands. They are served with hands in it."

Caitlyn was an amazing support for Ken. I'm not sure we would have a Whiskey Wednesday Show. Ken really could not have done it without her.





During the time home Caitlyn taught herself how to play guitar (dad was always around for advice) and started songwriting. We were fortunate she debuted both on the show.

After the Anniversary Video we return to the Live Broadcast with a dramatic performance by Ken. He was just turning off the feedback.

Now the reflecting begins, "Wow that was a forking trip man... folks what have we done here. Just an unbelievable time. It's funny I look at the names here (looking at iPad) and a lot of the names that I see tonight, I know there are a lot of lurkers who do not post (me!). The people that are posting are a lot of the same people that have been with me since the first night that I threw up a camera and said hey I am going to do a song."



"Deep Thoughts" with Ken

"I do want to say before I play this song and then I will disappear into this song for a minute while you all process what I am saying. Watching that video from the early days of Covid when I thought I was losing my mind and just sort of projecting it out to all of you in the world, I'm sorry. To getting my daughters involved and then the band, turning it into what it is now.

And the people around me, Barry for example and Mr. Grant, Neil and Steve. They have all put so much into this for nothing really. I pay for food, after the Show we all have a munch. When we play shows of course people get paid a little bit. It's so not about that, which is incredible.



"I'm late, I'm late, ahh, sorry." And then his signature giggle.



"We have three songs left. One was a request for a song last week that I rarely ever do. So get excited. The other one is a song that I have never done on the Whiskey Wednesday Show (yes he loves building drama)... And then we are going to drop that request." Earlier in the Show Richard asked for a little "devils and dust."



I really like these images.

As I mentioned earlier I just love sitting here by myself and shutting the rest of the world out. That's true, there is a small caveat to it though the people that I do let into my life I like around me all the time. It's often a small group of people but I really enjoy their company. The guys in the band, Barry and the extended people that I work with, it's such an honor and a pleasure to have your time and your talents to share with me and everybody else who's been watching.

Steve's Journey Continues...

People have been asking about Steve. I really don't know how to address it... Seven weeks ago Steve sat here with us and talked about being cancer free and how good he felt. The following week he wasn't feeling well. The week after that he had gone back into hospital and they thought something might be wrong. Within a few days they said his cancer had returned. That week it turned into the cancer is quite large and aggressive. And then two weeks ago I mentioned that his diagnosis is terminal. And they are working on going to Mexico and doing these treatments and stuff. I don't want to talk too much out of turn for the family. Me and Steve have said our goodbyes and I probably won't see him again, that's the reality. It's very tough for everybody. Sending out our love to Steve and the family."






After the song, "I send that out to Steve and the family tonight. That one kind of resonated, not so much the verse structure but the chorus. Steve showed up here all the time, he wasn't trying to change the world, he wasn't trying to reinvent the wheel, he was trying to support the song. To find a drummer who can do that is amazing."

"Me and Steve met on a Wednesday night at the pub. Before he left he was kind of in the band. He showed up the next week with a snare drum and that was it. There was never a question after that. It was just well I'm here every Wednesday, any Wednesday you want to play drums just come here. That's kind of how the band came together. That's how Steve became a part of it."

Here is an example of how small town living works. I saw Steve's recollection of their first meeting on Meghan's FB a couple of weeks ago. She posted, "I remember this night, I was the bartender! Thinkin good thoughts Steve Dagg." So yes the bartender at the time was Meagan who is now our cleaning friend/lady.



Billy Bragg is an English singersongwriter and left-wing activist. His music blends elements of folk music, punk rock and protest songs, with lyrics that mostly span political or romantic themes. His music is heavily centred on bringing about change and involving the younger generation in activist causes. At 65 he is still actively touring. A New England was released in 1983.







"I promised you all a song that I have never played on the Whiskey Wednesday Show and I am going to give it to you. This is a song called **Get Over It**. Today when I was learning it I was looking at the words and I was going that's interesting. Why did I not change that, that's not very strong, what does that mean. Then I realized I have detached from the song.

Songs sometimes when you write them they have meaning and purpose, sometimes they don't, usually for me they do. After a while of not playing a song, you look back at it, you sometimes forget the emotional attachment and what a certain line brings. When I sing certain lines in songs I visualize people, places, scenarios. Certain lines, if it's about a friend, every time I sing it I see their face in my head. Every now and then I come across a song where it all disappears. I can't remember what the connection is. The word son is in it so I am wondering if it has anything to do with my dad. But the message to the son is to trust everyone which is not my dad. So I am not sure where the song came from."



I met Ken a few months after we moved to town, on a Wednesday evening, at his long-running Whiskey Wednesday gig at the Church-key Pub (now That Little Pub). As a true newbie does, I showed up way too early and it was just Ken and the bartender in the pub at the time. As we sipped our pints, we chatted about Toronto life and relocating to a small town. Then we got onto music. Fast forward three years, and we're good friends and band mates He's a big reason why we love it so much up here. As we're all staying home during this weird time, Ken is keeping the whiskey Wednesday tradition going from his studio at home, so check him out tomorrow evening! Campbellford is lucky to have you, Ken Tizzard





That's OK we know that the next song will always make the cut. Ken switched to his Gibson which means he needs to tune it. Viewers are very used to watching Ken tune his guitar. This time we get to listen to songwriting tips.

"I'm going to change guitars, I think this one might be in drop D or close to drop D so let me just see. I didn't even mean to rhyme. All these young new musicians out there buying those rhyming dictionary's, fork that, just learn how to speak (I know he's sounding very bitter). I'm kidding, those rhyming dictionaries are great. It's a necessary tool for many musicians. Thesaurus, I find to be an effective tool...

What I can tell you, this was a really fun song to play with Bad Intent and I still love the version we did on the Goodness Of Bad Intent album... We always used to have a blast playing this song. David Fisher on drums and he would be screaming out. He always sang his vocals so forking loud (Ken gave a vivid description of Fisher singing)... I love Dave Fisher, miss him a lot, I hope to see you soon buddy." And with that detailed introduction he began the song.

After the song, "I still don't know what that song is about. I don't even know if it's a good song... I think with the band it was a different thing." Ken seemed very confused, so I am not sure if we will be seeing that song again on the Whiskey Wednesday Show, Iol.



There is a difference between a rhyme and what they call a soft rhyme. A soft rhyme is when you take a word that does not rhyme with another word and you just kind of make them rhyme."




Bruce Springsteen is an American singer and songwriter. He has released 21 studio albums during a career spanning six decades, most of which feature his backing band, the E Street Band. He is an originator of heartland rock, a genre combining mainstream rock music with poetic and socially conscious lyrics that tell a narrative about working-class American life. Nicknamed "The Boss" he is known for his lyrics and energetic concerts, with performances that can last more than four hours.

Ken is wrapping up the Show and getting ready to play the last song of the evening. "Thanks for another amazing year supporting the Whiskey Wednesday Show... We have put about 12 grand into gear this year and made a portion of it back through your donations. So that really helps and inspires us to get more. I am one camera away... Thanks for supporting us emotionally, financially, sharing with your friends on Facebook and social media."

We then enjoyed one of my all-time favorite covers, **Bruce Springsteen's, Devils And Dust.** Ken always delivers a haunting rendition. I love when he "talks" to viewers at the end of the song while still strumming, "It's been a solitary and beautiful Wednesday night. I've missed my friends but I have also made room for the gratefulness that they are in my life regularly."

We have to say goodbye to our friend, our drummer, and one of the Goats. How do we do this? I was not sure how to approach summarizing this very special Show so I decided to take you through our process of putting this episode together.

On Saturday, March 25th in the afternoon Ken received the sad news that Steve had passed away that morning. We knew that this news was imminent, you're never really prepared, it always takes your breath away. It's always strange to go from saying "Steve is" to "Steve was." Ken and the Goats had a show that evening in Picton. I'm glad the boys had music, each other and an attentive audience to help them process this news.

We knew Wednesday's Show would be dedicated to Steve. It was four days away. I jumped into action. I knew we would be putting a video together so I started going through many hours of Whiskey Wednesday Shows to find everything I could on Steve. Regular magazine readers will know, this job was made for me. Yes it was very emotional however it was also so wonderful. It felt like I was having multiple conversations with Steve and then the "aha" moment. I realized that's the approach we should take in the video, Steve telling us his own journey.

To give you background before watching or reading about the video, Steve would generously give viewers cancer recovery updates. He was always open and vulnerable with us.

It is with a shattered heart that I share with you the passing of my very best friend, the most incredible, devoted father to our children, Frankie + Jolene, the person I have had THE PRIVILEGE of calling my partner for almost 20 years, and my husband for almost 12.

After a long, but also very short, battle with terminal cancer, Steve is at peace and no longer suffering.

These were posted on Sunday.

I was hoping the video (Steve's words), the Whiskey Wednesday Show (Ken's words) and the magazine (my interpretation) would come together to document Steve's final journey.



As always Ken does a wonderful job welcoming viewers to the Show and setting the tone for the evening. "Good evening ladies and gentlemen and welcome to the Whiskey Wednesday Show my name is Ken Tizzard and we are Music for Goats. We are here every Wednesday to entertain you, take your mind off things for a while. We have got a very special show planned for you this evening celebrating the life of Stephen Dagg.

Before we get into that... I have a bit of an apology for not making a public thank you for everybody for helping out this past week at the Legion when we did the fundraiser for the (Bridge Street) Hospice. That was on Friday



night and it was an incredible success. And for those who came out to Picton on Saturday as well, I haven't really said thanks the way I usually do via social media. And also for the people who have been reaching out to me for the past 10 days or so, maybe even two weeks, I have been very ignorant to return calls, keeping my head down and laying low. The impending news of Steve was something we were acutely aware of and it has been a very challenging time. So if I have missed your phone call and have been ducking people, I'm sorry I have just been dealing with a lot of stuff."

Our Steve celebration now begins with Ken's thoughtful reflection, "Tonight is the culmination of it. The last time we actually saw Steve is when we went over to Mr. Grants house to listen to the new record which is recorded, a chance where everybody could give their critique's of the work that I put into making it sound like an album. We all made notes, Steve made some great notes, I still have his notes in there. And that Monday Steve was back at Mount Sinai and none of us saw him physically again after. We were hopeful, we were confused, we were up, we were down. It just turned out that it all came to pass this Saturday when Steve left us. We are terribly sorry for his family, Kim, the girls, Jolene and Frankie and of course Charlie (their dog), Steve's dad Bernie.



We were a part of Steve's life in a way that was different. Steve walked into the pub November, seven years ago. I was playing, at the time it was probably just me and Mr. Grant because we had done some Ron Hynes tribute shows as a duo, I didn't want a band at that point. Steve and Kim came in and sat at the bar one night. After we played a couple of songs Steve introduced himself and I chatted

with him at the bar. He said we just moved to town, I am a drummer. I said OK next Wednesday bring your snare drum down. He said the full kit. I said no just bring your snare drum let's see what it's all about. I never know

what to expect when I was doing those Wednesday nights I had all kinds of people joining me. He came back the next Wednesday and it was never ever discussed after he was just the drummer. It was me and Mr. Grant and then it was Steve. Shortly after Ken Kelly a similar thing happened, he came into the pub one night saw the trio playing and he said what the hell is this, my guitar is in the car can I go get it? Again I was like sure, I turned to the guys sorry, I don't know what I got us into. And then this amazing guitar player appears and starts playing with us. For the time he lived in Campbellford he was a regular on the Wednesday night circuit over there as well and actually played on the Good Dog record as well as Steve." Ken Kelly was watching this evening. You will see him soon in the video coming up.





Fare Thee Well lyrics that speak to me, "If there's nothing more when this life is through, let it stand that I have enjoyed this time with you."

At this point Ken does a detailed intro to Steve's video which I'm going to come back to shortly. Ken explains the outline for the evening; going to play a song at the beginning; show the video; and then bounce back to being live for a final song. It was now time for some music with an original, **Fare The Well**, "I wrote this song for Elly Kelly from Joe Kelly (local family). When Joe was sick with cancer, I spent

"It was never a guestion with Steve. He's just been here and he would be here, it was never a consideration that he wouldn't. There were times when he was busy. He was younger than the the four of us, in some cases by 30 years (Neil confirmed, he is proudly the oldest Goat). He fit in with us, he was just part of the gang, he traveled with us, he played music with us. That's sort of the Steve we know. That's why when I reach out to his family to offer condolences... It's been a really full on music thing. And a great friendship as well. He was a really smart guy, he was really clever, had a great sense of humour. I loved talking to him about pop media, television, stuff like that. New Netflix shows, we were always in tune with what was happening. If one of us found something first it was always a thrill to let the other know.

some time with him at the end. One of the things that he wondered about was the afterlife, heaven, hell, whether they exist, whether he will see Elly. Then a few years later after he passed I was doing Elly's last record while she was battling cancer as well. I wrote this song one night and I realized it was for Elly from Joe. Tonight I send it out to Kim from Steve." What a beautifully perfect, sad and happy song all at the same time.

It is now time for the video premiere. Here is Ken's and my introduction for Steve's video. Ken, "My wife Allison actually went through 200 hours (a Ken embellishment, lol) of video from the past two years and isolated all the points where Steve was chatting... I went through them all and edited them into this massive video at first. That I then shrunk down. And then I put all these photos all over it and then I looked and it was confusing so then I took some of the photos out. And then I showed it to Allison and then she had her input. So it was three days of filling my head with Steve Dagg which has been wonderful."

My introduction... The video ended up being one hour and 16 minutes. In case you were wondering there are 43 separate video segments masterly put together by Ken. To my credit my production notes were stellar. Each video segment had a start and finish time right down to the second.

I would like to talk briefly about photos. Viewers know Ken does a wonderful job with his guest videos. Always adding photos and captions, which adds a lot to the enjoyment and understanding. For Steve's video I suggested that we only include photos of Steve (band), Kim, Frankie and Jolene. We do not know Steve's






extended family and friends and I wanted to be mindful that we don't unknowingly be insensitive.

The third video was for A Good Dog Is Lost (Ron Hynes), which was filmed in 2018 in the upstairs recording studio which started off as our master bedroom.

The second video was for Judgment (Ron Hynes), which was filmed at our local bowling alley in 2019. Ken was certainly going for the "intense" facial expression in this video, lol.

I looked at this band photo photo and asked Ken why Neil was not in the video. That opened a whole can of worms and for the "purest" I'm going to correct some dates.

What's going on, I'm ringing a bell, I thought I was going to pass out or something (lots of laughter). But luckily that's over and a bit of a break right now."

Ken, "That's great and then it's onwards and upwards from here. You've got a month off now right? A month recovery before they re-examine and decide what the next course is. Man we are so happy to see you through that first part and we are really happy to have you back tonight. Everybody has been asking about you every week." Steve, "It's good to be here for sure."

Ken's original song This Town Of Mine has a signature Steve closing. Ken, "That's what we have been missing, Steve Dagg's patented sound of rust." During the video this evening Ken posted, "The sound of rust will always be a Steve Dagg thing."

It started with Ken, "You're in full cranky old man mood (referring to Neil)...Steve just showed up and he just heard it tonight...This is a treat for you all at home I will call out some changes for Steve... I'll see if I'll remember, I don't know what's going to happen. I have to remember how to play this song. I have got to remember the new words that I just re-wrote today. Prepare yourself for some mumbling."

Steve's smile priceless and Ken's hair insane. Just For Men was definitely used that day, lol.

Then wise Mr. Grant asked, "So Ken what is this new song called? Give us a title." Ken answers, "The title of the song is a Dollar A Day." Mr. Grant, "All




October 19, 2022

Kim made a quick video on the day our local Trent Hills Tribune newspaper came out. She used a William Prince song in the background which is so fitting. Steve often told me his music was very special to them. This photo was taken last summer at the William Prince concert at Westben. Hard to believe Steve and Lorna are no longer here... "At least we'll always have what we had."











After Steve's video we returned to the live broadcast. I was so impressed, amazed and proud of the boys keeping it together and sharing their feelings and thoughts. Vulnerability at its finest.



Neil went first, "Steve has a sister I think her name is Karen (it is) I thought I should just mention condolences to her as well... I am obviously the newest member of the Goats. Well maybe not obviously. I have been a part of this crew for about four years. And never having played in a band prior to this I was, to put it mildly, scared shitless. I used to take great comfort in the fact that I could turn around, I would look at Steve and wink and he would look at me and smile. That level of understanding that the four of us have is what has made this such a special little group for us and we are going to miss him terribly."

Ken, "Steve offered a musical security that is rare. I have had the luck to work with a few drummers like that. Drummers that you can just walk on stage and know that everything is going to be fine behind you. It's an amazing feeling of comfort as someone who is at the front of the stage moving around and carrying on with the audience, singing and doing all that. To know that, that person has got their shit together is so reassuring. And to be also such a cool guy as he was. You would always turn around, he always had a great smile. Watching those videos, he was smiling so much.



We are going to do one more song to end and I will tell a little story. I used to play at the pub a lot. I did it every Wednesday for I think 11 years. And that's what became the Whiskey Wednesday Show when things got shut down... Steve adapted... He went from this guy who would show up at the pub to a great friend, a great band mate. He did all of our videos for us. The End Of The World video that I showed at the end, he actually shot and directed that while being in it. He was so modest and so cool about things. When we were talking about the new drum throne, new drum seat. I mentioned Liam's name, he's been filling in for you, oh yeah thanks Liam. He was just such a relaxed, cool guy and that vibe is so important to what we do. And he is going to be missed."



Mr. Grant then shared, "I remember at the end of a new song. We were just playing a new song up in the studio and I just turned to you and went, where did you find this guy? He was a great drummer and it was a privilege to have played with him."



Ken captured this image of Mr. Grant watching Steve's video. As they say, "A picture is worth a thousand words."

Ken, "We are going to close out the night with a song." First he tells us the last story of the evening. "So we used to go down to the pub, 8 o'clock Steve would show up. Well we started at eight... anywhere from three minutes before to three minutes after eight Steve would show up. Unload his drum kit really fast because it is already 8 o'clock and we are supposed to be playing our first song. But it is the pub, there is only two people at the bar, it doesn't really matter we are there all night anyways... Before we played our first set we would run out to the alley and smoke a

joint. Steve would always come out and stand there and I would be would you like a hit? No, no, I've got to play music. I'm like, there's four people in there, it's early in the night, you'll be all right. No, no, no. We would play the first set, it would be great. We would take a break before the second set. We would go out, Steve would probably have a puff or two. No, no I don't want to get to forked up, I still have to play."







"We would finish the second set and that was officially the end of the night. Before we tore down we would all go out into the alley, we would all light up big joints and at that point Steve would smoke like the rest of us. And then he would turn to me, can we just go inside, turn the lights down really low, turn the PA really down low and play some quiet, mellow, groovy shit. And I would say OK and whoever else was playing with us Neil or Ken Kelly or Mr. Grant or whoever else happened to be around. Are you guys cool doing another three songs or something?"

"And the one song he always wanted to play was Boy From Old Perlican. We are going to end off the night with this for Steve. This is a song written by Ron Hynes from St. John's Newfoundland. Ron was one of my idols. Steve played on the tribute record that I made for Ron called A Good Dog Is Lost. That was the first recording that I did with Steve. In the fall we recorded the drum tracks and bed tracks for the record. The new record that is upcoming. So I get to sit with Steve's drums for hours, listening to them while I am editing, that's going to be pretty beautiful..."

Cheers to our good friend Steve!"

I know that was an in-depth glimpse into Steve's journey through the eyes of the Whiskey Wednesday Show.

Once I started, I was committed and stopped thinking about how long this was and just enjoyed spending time with Steve.

Ken, Neil and myself have done a lot of reflecting at the dinner table. We only knew Steve for 7 years, a small fraction of his 42 years. However time means nothing. It's what we shared in those 7 years.

Let's look again at this quote from the beginning. I truly believe when Steve was sitting behind his kit on a Wednesday night he was being healed by music, even if it was just for a few hours. We are hoping music has the same healing power for all of you.

SHOW whatta ya at?

Episode 9-Wednesday, March 1st

Tonight's whatta ya at? with Kris + Dee was divided into two parts and we enjoyed an acoustic song before each video. The first song was *No Tattoo* from their 4th album *Browse Line* (2019).

What beautiful performances, their vocals and guitar playing compliment each other so well. A viewer commented, "Canada's Indigo Girls."

I bet you're wondering who are Kris + Dee. Ken had another entertaining whatta ya at? Another viewer comment, "Love the variety and diversity of the

interviews." Ken's Rolodex still has a few more names! I bet some readers are going to have to look up that word.





Ken started the interview with another name faux pas. He always manages to get out of awkward situations with humour and never gets flustered.

Ken, "Ladies and gentlemen I have with me today on the Whiskey Wednesday Show, Dee McDonald and Kris Abbott." Kris quickly corrected him, "It's Dee McNeil." Ken blamed the error on his poor penmanship, that he could not read himself. I will confirm it's like chicken scratch. That's why I encourage Ken to do "legible" setlists for the Goats. He's even started putting them on computer. The interview has now officially begun.

Ken attempt number two, "Dee McNeil and Kris Abbott, you guys are in a band together, it's called Kris + Dee, do I understand you are a married couple?" Yes they are, going on 18 years. I loved and appreciated that they generously shared their marriage journey with us.

Kris, "For us it was a super big thrill because when we got married it was at the very beginning of it all. When we went to City Hall they didn't even have our marriage certificate. We were like who's going to be the guy, who's going to be the girl. The groom, the bride. They didn't have the paperwork. I remember being hugely nervous walking up and we said we would like a marriage certificate. The person didn't even register... it was so new they didn't really get it."



Ken responded, "Fantastic...You really were on the forefront of what is today just considered, the generation that is growing up now will consider this normal." I love Ken's positivity and I do hope the same. I googled some history and I feel we have a long way to go.



Kris and Dee then reflected on a very personal memory, "We were kind of old school... when we were deciding to get married we both decided to go home to tell our moms. Dee made the trip to Armprior to tell her mom and I made the trip to Kingston to tell my mom. It was a very interesting experience."

Ken asked, "Were you both, I'm not sure what the terminology would be, were you both out of the closet gay women at that point." Yes they were, sort of. Dee explained, "Long story short. I wasn't so much with my mom. The rest of my family I was. My conversation with my mom that weekend was a I'm coming out and I'm getting married. I did a two for one. Bless her heart she handled it so well." Kris added, "She said she liked me."

Ken, "I think at the end of the day our parents they love us and just want us to be happy." Kris then shared her thoughts, "My mom was a surprise because my mom has always been very, very supportive of anything I've ever done. Don't sell your guitar whatever you do. Very supportive of my coming out. But when we were deciding to get married it was in the middle of a lot of the political controversy...When I went home to tell her I remember she was sitting in her kitchen with her back to me and she was reading the paper, as she did every paper every

morning. And I decided to tell her. I was a little chicken but at the same time I knew she really loved Dee so I wasn't feeling like it was going to be a bad message... She just said to me why do you want to do that for. And I was shocked. And all I could say was well we are going to do it and I would really like for you to be there but that's your choice. That's where we kind of ended it. And then she was sitting there in silence and I walked back into the kitchen and I said you know mom one day you are not going to be around and I don't want to be in a hospital room (a small pause, an emotional response) fighting for my rights and she nodded."

Thanks Kris and Dee for being so open and vulnerable with us. Ken responded, "What a fantastically emotional story. I always say to friends of mine who that's their life as well of how proud I am of them ... It was a very hard life to live just because of the social pressures. It's because of people like you, standing up for your rights, that

people coming down the road are going to be able to love who they love. It's an amazing thing."

After the interview Ken was worried that he may have used incorrect terminology, he always wants to be mindful he does not offend anyone. I told him he always chooses his words carefully and his intentions are always inclusive.

I liked how Dee redirected the interview, "We started this so sappy, I guess it's Valentine's Day." Yes Ken inadvertently scheduled their interview for Valentine's evening. That's OK, it was a very special night.

Now time to talk about their musical journey with more of their love story mixed in. Ken, "I heard briefly the story of how you met...Dee you were playing with the band called the Strap-Ons and Kris you went to a show with a friend of yours. She put you guys together, magic happened, that's the beginning of the whole history book." Dee elaborated, "Totally, that's the story. The Strap-Ons had a gig in Toronto. Kris's good friend Patricia dragged her out. Kris wasn't playing music at the time, guitar was in the case, she was just kind of (Kris completed Dee's sentence, "pouting"), ves pouting and not doing a lot of music. We were on a break probably heading to the bar. Patricia who I didn't know, I just remember this hand reaching across a few people deep, she grabbed my arm and she pulled me over and she said you need to meet my friend. I said oh, she goes she is an amazing guitar player...it was like guided... It was one of those moments where you feel like why did that happen, somebody that I don't know reaches across and just knows that we were meant to be together. Bless her heart Patricia Wilson, an amazing person, she's the reason we're together." Now isn't this the perfect love story for Valentine's Day.



Ken, "How long were you together before you started playing music. How fantastic to find the love of your life who is also a musician and you can write songs together. That's a dream." Dee continues sharing their love story, "We just met that day, we definitely hit it off, exchanged emails.



We kept in contact over the course of a year. The Strap-Ons were coming back to do a show in Toronto. Our guitarist quit, you know band drama... So we needed a guitar player, I reached out to Kris and said would you play. Well no I'm not really playing. I said come on it will be fun. You know we are a three chord wonder band as you know, the tunes are fun, we're nice, would you reconsider. OK send me the tracks. So I sent her the tunes, she said OK I'll do it."



Kris had a slightly different version of events, "No I didn't say it quite like that. I said I'll come out and see you play... You know what it's like Ken, the music business is really really serious and they love you when you're hot and when you're not it's like wow it's crazy. I was trying to figure out maybe I don't need to do this, maybe I need to figure out who I am really. When I went to the show they were really having a lot of fun. I thought that's interesting, so I went up to talk to them and say hey maybe I'll play with you. First thing that happened was they dragged me off into a corner and started playing Johnny Cash songs, like punk Johnny Cash...So I said OK let's jam." Dee added, "Can you imagine trying to show off for Kris Abbott from The Pursuit Of Happiness. We thought we were just so hot."



They are not done, Kris, "The best part of the whole story is when I said I would rehearse with them, the band lived in London. Gosh I hope we're not taking up too much of your time with this, it's a crazy story." Ken had the perfect response, "No no, this is what it's all about."

Kris continues, "There was a hockey arena, it had hotel units attached to it from the days when hockey teams would travel around. They were abandoned, the band was basically squatting...
They had two adjoining units, one was a rehearsal room, one was a party room, it was all decorated...
The first rehearsal I went to, I arrived and they had a crockpot (Dee added "we made her dinner") they were just going for it. I said woah this is really amazing. Then we jammed and it was really fun, again it was fun. So I said sure I will do some shows. We started off as friends, then the friendship got stronger and then it was really hard not to be in love...

It kind of reminded me of coming full circle back to why you start playing music with people. There is that crazy connection that is not about language, it's about trust, it's about energy... We continued to rehearse,

every weekend going off to London was in event. It would be like a gig because people would just wander up. They all knew how to get up into this squatter rehearsal space. It was jammed full of people and we would be rehearsing to an audience. It was just really, really, really cool."

I think Ken was a little envious, "When I was younger, as a teenager in St. John's Newfoundland some friends of mine, Kent and Llew had an old building that had been neglected downtown. They turned it into a four room unit that all the bands rehearsed in and of course a bunch of people slept there. 70 people there some nights while the bands were jamming. And then when I moved to Toronto I started looking for bands. I found a band, we got signed and went on the road. I missed that period in my 20s when all the bands were together. Rather than get an apartment, everybody would rent a loft somewhere and it would be a jam space as well. I remember when I was touring and going back to the local bands place for a party after, it was always like a jam spot and I always thought that was so cool." Yes Ken missed "band loft living" we were dating at this point. I was definitely not into communal living. My friends and family would laugh at this idea.



It was then time to figure out how their musical paths crossed. Ken, "I came to Toronto in 87, 88 and I did the Queen Street circuit pretty hard for a bunch of years...What year were you guys (Strap-Ons) coming around?" Dee, "Late 90s, early 2000's, we played a lot in the gay ghetto, the Looking Glass, the bars on Church Street." Kris added, "Pride festivals around Ontario. Oh my gosh so many stories. It was at my lull when The Pursuit Of Happiness was changing gears a little bit."





The Lursuit Of Happiness




The Pursuit of Happiness (TPOH) is a Canadian group formed in 1985 by singer and songwriter Moe Berg and drummer Dave Gilby when they moved from Edmonton to Toronto. Kris Abbott (guitar/backing vocals) joined in early 1988. I am sure you would recognize their best known song "I'm an Adult Now".





I thought this would be a good time to explore Kris's other musical journey.



You might recall (TPOH) opened for the Watchmen in Winnipeg last year. Ken had live concert footage in Moe Berg's whatta ya at? interview video. (Episode 16, April 20th). I remember watching and thinking who is the amazingly cool woman playing guitar. I'm so glad to meet her virtually.



Back to the interview, Ken asked, "What genre of music was the band (Strap-Ons) put into?" Kris answered, "It kind of had a pop element to it and a little bit of a country element but everything was played with a little bit of punk attitude and feel. Everything tended to be on ten and fast. Really, really great songwriting."

Dee added her thoughts, "We all wrote, everybody but the drummer wrote songs. Bring your dirty laundry in a song and everybody plays it. Everybody knew who we were talking about. The band knew who you were talking about, then the audience knew who you were talking about, our songs were so literal." Kris gave example, "There is a song that we have on our very first Kris + Dee album still here inside, some of that record is really heavy. Our thing is dark happy. There is a song called *Void* that comes from Dee's previous song writing and we did a Kris + Dee thing to it. An ex girlfriend shows up and invited us out for dinner with her new girlfriend, she's like that's song about me (lots of laughter)."





Ken shared his own experience which turned into a back-andforth tutorial about songwriting, "I have a lot of people in my life that know that certain songs are about them and they are the only ones that know. It's an interesting thing as a songwriter. It sounds similar to me I pull from the people around me." Kris adds, "The songwriting process is really cool like that. The genesis of an idea and then where it ends up."

Dee then had a question for Ken, "Have you had people ask, Ken is this song about me?" Ken's reply, "It's funny I was writing a song and I was reflecting on problems my friends were having in their late 30s. Most being cocaine and infidelity in their relationships. I wrote a song and I had a line that was geared directly at a friend. And he called me and he was so mad saying that song is it about me. I said yeah you're in it." To sum up this friend got the line completely wrong, the line about him "was actually quite positive." This led to a familiar topic.

I know regulars have heard Ken explain the writing of Waste Your Time, the song he wrote for me, many times, here's a little bit of a different spin, "One of the hardest things for me... In 2014 I was writing an album called No Dark No Light, one night I was lying in bed with my wife, she was getting ready to go to sleep because she works during the day and I work at night. I had been writing all of this new material and telling her oh I wrote this song about this, this verse means... She said to me why have you never written me a song. It felt like somebody hit me with a 2 by 4. I didn't have an answer because I had never written my wife a song. She's in every song but I



had never written her a song. I had to write her a song before the morning broke. It's actually one of my favorite songs." The ladies loved hearing the inspiration behind the song.





Back to Ken, "The song writing process, it's incredibly intense. I've been lucky to experience it on my own and in several different writing sessions with other people. I'm not one of those people who writes with 100 people and gets together with people every week to write songs. I don't do that but I have had the luxury of writing with members of the Watchmen, Thornley, Brian Finlay he is a theater guy that I work with. And I love that experience too because it's really nice to have somebody else's perspective on a song."

Dee shared her thoughts about songwriting, "I think it's easier to write about non happy things. I think that happiness to me at least is not a very complex emotion. It's easy to be happy and you do not, nor should you deconstruct it. So when we talk about our primary relationships, yes they don't always make good fodder for songwriting because it is what it is, don't analyze it, it's great. Some of those darker emotions maybe are where the songwriting comes out. You're really trying to explore what it's all about. The song writing process sort of helps explain some of that."



We are then treated to a classic Ken, in the moment, from the heart monologue. "And being around great songwriters that's been my strongest point of learning. Especially spending time with people like Ron Hynes. Masters of their craft who are revered worldwide. And when you get to spend day after day with them, it's not like you sat with them for an hour and had a conversation, you start to learn their routines, they start to tell you about their family, their history. And then it's slowly comes out, bits and pieces of their toolbox of songwriting. And it's a real gift to be around when you get that chance." I think regulars would agree with me I've never heard him tell the Ron Hynes story quite that way before. I liked how the video goes to black, it did feel like a "drop the mic and get off the stage" kind of moment, lol.

The end of Part 1





Part two started with their second acoustic song *Settled Down* also from *Browse Line* (2019). Again just wonderfull! I love musical guests, listening to new songwriters, different genres, always unique and different. This video was beautiful. I thought it felt like we were at a mini concert in our own living rooms or in my case my bedroom loft.

The interview started with Ken writing their band bio, "How did it go from rock 'n' roll with The Pursuit Of Happiness to punk pop power flavored Americana alt country for the lack of a better word for the Strap-Ons. Now you are known as, what did I read it as, a married philiso folk band. I thought OK that's interesting. I had never heard of that one before." I don't think they had either, Dee replied, "I think they made it up."

She than elaborates, "We talk about it all the time, we have written a lot of songs by the water. So I think the water has a beats per minute, you certainly get into the vibe. We both played in up tempo bands and maybe there was a craving there to express yourself not balls to the wall."

She then handed it off to Kris, "It's definitely a strange path...We've grown with it I hope...We found our thing early on in our songwriting relationship and we stayed with it. On the technical side of things, there is a sound in Dee's voice that I really, really enjoy and it happens in a certain kind of timbre and tempo. And this is a very woody instrument. So we naturally sat around with acoustic guitars to express that songwriting. It was a really easy way for us to morph ideas in that vehicle. Later on we have four albums out, they are a lot more technical as things go along because of experimentation. It's where we enjoy singing as a duo. That's a really hard thing, it's different then being a singer songwriter. Being a duo is a really different kind of a challenge."

Ken added his thoughts, "You essentially have to learn to breathe together." Dee contributed, "You're riding together." Ken, "All the inflections, where the lines start and ends. To get those things sounding perfect together takes a long time. I think that's why siblings sound so good together, they are used to each other's inflections." Kris agreed, "There's nothing like blood. When you have blood you have love."

Ken moves the interview along with his next question, "You have put out four albums, starting in 2011 with the debut and then going most recently to 2019. How was it putting out an album and then having the pandemic shut everything down, not being able to tour. How did that impact you?"


Kris explained the impact, I absolutely LOVE their philosophy towards balancing music and life. "Our whole musical story is a little bit different. Not right or wrong just different for us in that our life is what makes our music, music does make our life. So we are OK if it takes big pauses. We are OK to live life because we just know that on the other end of it music is just going to come out. We don't want it to be the other way around so it's an OK relationship with our music. With the pandemic, we thought this record, you always think it's your best record, it kind of felt like we were really growing on this one. And we have a band that we really love, we thought we would play a lot. So that was a disappointment but it wasn't the same kind of heartbreak others had. We don't rely on




it for our identity. We've worked hard on that. We have accepted that when it is in our life, it's in our life big time. And when it is not in our life, it just means that we are living life and that we have faith that our living life will bring music to us."

Dee adds, "There was a phase for sure when we were thinking with these pauses would you ever write another song again. It just happens. We have lost that insecurity, we just have faith in the process. If you have any shred of humility in yourself as an artist you got to know it doesn't come from you. It comes from somewhere else it might go through you, it might channel through you but it doesn't come from you. We can all just relax and wait for it to hit."

Kris shared another insight, "Then the other factor is that we are both pretty introverted people so we're OK not talking. Dee agrees, "The stage is the most introverted place on earth. It's comfortable because it is introverted. It's the intermission that's the hard part." I have never thought about the "stage" and "intermission" like this before.



Viewers know Ken and I are navigating our unique personal situation with Ken's musical journey. Ken was inspired by the ladies words, "That's a really interesting way to be living. It shows that you are practicing self compassion which is something that I'm learning... Allow it to take a pause. And that mentally has got me through the past five or six years... I am sort of at that place too, I don't need to be chasing a dream or looking for record deals. I do what I want, I mostly produce this Whiskey Wednesday Show, happens once a week for whoever happens to be

watching. It takes up my entire week to get this show together... I kind of realized the dream is here. All the time that I was on the road chasing the dream and living the dream and having a great time doing it... Now I've built a recording studio in my house. I have built a television studio with six cameras that broadcast this weekly show... As you said you get comfortable accepting the pause and accept when it's happening to be fully involved."

I loved Ken's epiphany moment. We are starting to accept and embrace a forced early retirement. We both feel the Whiskey Wednesday Show is our retirement gig. A pretty cool journey that we can do together.

Dee agrees, "And quite honestly why isn't that the dream. There is an inner dialogue, we have to place very close attention to it because a lot of the time it is not our friend. There can be very vicious things happening in our heads. Left unchecked, they damage but brought into the light, into our awareness we can challenge it." Ken, "My therapist once told me my thoughts aren't real. When you have a thought, no matter what the thought is, imagine picking it up and holding it and looking at it. That's like turning on a lightbulb in a dark room suddenly the darkness goes away and then you can choose to examine it. Or you can just lay it down in the (imagined) river in front of you, let it go and grab the next thought that comes along. The key is remembering that these thoughts aren't real."

What a wonderfully inspiring interview about music, love and life and finding the right balance that works for you

Third, in *Part 1* he takes us to a couple of special destinations which inspired me to share our love story.



Let's get started with the introduction. OK what is it with Ken and messing up the names of guests, he is now batting three for three. Ken, "Ladies and gentlemen I am happy to have on the Show with me today an old friend from Newfoundland who I haven't seen in a long time John Pastore. Now when I met John, I think we all called you Johnny back then. Does anybody ever call you Johnny anymore?" John replied, "No, not really." Ken wasn't sure if he was ever called Johnny, lol. At the very start of tonight's Show Ken admitted his error. "We revisit with an old buddy of mine John Pastore or Johnny Pastore as I used to call him and I think everybody used to call him. We talked a little bit about that, it seems like nobody use to call him that except me."

We are now back to the interview video. Lots of names talked about, many unfamiliar to me, there were a few regular viewers mentioned along the way. Ken, "Johnny (he changes to John later) was a part of the hard-core scene you have all heard me talk about a lot. I remember the first time, you were with Public Enemy at the time, which was a St. John's hard-core (punk) band before the rap group came out. I had something on the go with Clark and Llew (we know these names, Clark and Llew is Llewellyn), we were working a lot at the French Society. And when I mean working, we had the keys for the French Society where his mom worked. We used to go in at night and jam." Ken spilled the beans Llew would "take" his mom's keys. Ah teenagers!


Back to Ken trying to figure out connections in the past. "I seem to remember a period of time when me and you were hanging out a little bit, I don't remember if it was through skateboards or if we were jamming together but I remember being at your house several times. And you had all of these amazing hard-core posters that I think you were getting from someone you knew in Montreal. Does that ring any bells?" John replies, "It does but only vaguely. It sounds right. I feel like we practiced in my basement...I remember hanging out at the Francophone Society."



Ken asked, "The posters, where were you getting them?" John, "I can't remember. I wrote a lot of letters to people, it must've been all through the mail." Ken elaborated, "Well everything was kind of mail order back then. We would always wait for an Alternative Tentacles record to come in. No matter what it was you would buy it for the order sleeve inside."















Dance clubs (Twilight Zone) were more my scene, lol.

Destination #1 Down to the Battery



Remember earlier in my recap of this episode, Ken mentioned that in Part 1 they only get to talk about the name of Outer Battery Records and then Ken gets distracted. Disclaimer a few names of unfamiliar places coming up. They were so descriptive it felt like we were traveling the streets of St. Johns. As always Ken does his best to demonstrate using hand gestures. Gratefully the "moving" camera was not used. And I had so much fun researching the Battery.

Let's see what happened. John, "We were going to call it Battery Records but that already existed. Because Dave and I grew up in the Battery. Dave grew up in the Outer Battery so that's where the name came from."

Let's see where Ken goes with this. It took a little while to figure out which house John lived in when they met. This is where they take us all over town, lol. I am going to give you the Coles notes.

John moved to the Battery when he was four and left when he was 15. When his parents got divorced in his last two years of high school he lived between a house on Barnes Road and Tunis Court. This is where they met. John, "It's weird how many people I know from Newfoundland know me from there even though it was only two years of my life." Ken, "Well that was a very social time. Your house was on a regular rotation of places to drop into."

I bet you're wondering why this is all important. Ken, "So you are actually a downtowner (John agrees 100%). I always thought you were midtown, middle class. So growing up in the Battery. I grew up in town as you know, the northern end of town, my backyard went to the tree line and there were trees right out to the airport. I spent all my time in the woods as a kid... What was it like growing up in the Battery where you are right hanging off the cliff on the water almost?"



Now we get to something different, life in the Battery.





John, "It was fun. I say that I could throw a rock from my window and it would land in the ocean... I smelled salt my whole life... I had a paper route when I was younger up Signal Hill that was fun but brutal. In winter trying to fight my way up even on the sidewalks. And once you got up to where the hotel was, there were no roads. I don't even think you

The Battery is a neighbourhood within the city of St. John's that sits on the entrance to the harbour, on the slopes of Signal Hill. It is sometimes described as an outport within the city and is noted for its steep slopes, and colourful houses. The Battery has been the site, over the centuries, for gun emplacements (batteries), for the defense of St. John's Harbour, including during both World Wars.

Are you surprised there have been avalanches? The latest in 2020, with one home being damaged.

could drive into them. I would be taking these snowy paths delivering newspapers."

Ken, "I really didn't discover downtown until I was 13 or 14 when I met the scene down there and started skateboarding and playing punk rock. I think it would be fascinating to grow up that close to the harbour as a child."





Construction of Cabot Tower began in 1898 to commemorate the 400th anniversary of John Cabot's discovery of Newfoundland, and Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee.

Picture of The Battery and Signal Hill. On a clear day you can see for miles down the coast toward Cape Spear, the easternmost point of North America.

They then talked about the changes in the Battery which led to another destination.

John, "Obviously St. John's isn't a huge city, it felt like urban living because Water Street basically ended at the base of our house... It felt like intercity living." Ken agreed, "You were in the heart of the city and had the best seat in the house for New Year's Eve fireworks."



John, "The Battery was artsy but run down when I was a kid and now there's money and fancy houses." He's not kidding, I just checked houses in the Battery are around \$750,000. Ken shared his opinion, "Downtown St. John's was artsy and run down. It gave the artists a cheap place to live and because we were all so tight I think that's a big part of why the community was thriving. You remember the years when we were growing up we had all the punk rockers, then we had all the theater kids and then we were doing stuff with the adult crowd, CODCO folks...I was asking Andrew Younghusband about it recently what do you think happened to downtown? The artists got driven out, they can't afford to live there anymore. So that community has dispersed, it's not as tight and vibrant as it used to be."

John agreed, "Sadly that's been happening everywhere, all the cool cities. When you moved to Toronto and I moved to Montreal it was easy to live right in the center because people with money didn't want to live there... I could have found any apartment that I wanted... and if I had been thinking I could've bought anything I wanted back then. We weren't thinking like that back in those days."



Ken shared, "I think of some of the moves Allison and I have made. The first house that we left in Toronto is right in the middle of the Gooderham & Worts District. At the time it had old decrepit rundown areas. Allison's parents had a company with a living space above. We sold the place for just bottom barrel to get out, now it would be prime Toronto real estate."





I'm so happy I found this photo. Many memories, was a great spot, we were in our mid-20s but it was a very, very sketchy area. This photo is from the condo listing. I was actually surprised it's up for \$869,000. We thought it would be more.

Now we're getting to the next destination. Ken, "I'm glad to be out of the city. I never really felt comfortable in the city. I did my first year in the city and then I moved to a boat and I stayed over there for 11 years." Ken shared his memories and I will add some details and correct any inconsistencies, lol. We will start with his recollection of time, it was not 11 years.

John asked, "Was that just in Toronto Harbour, where was the boat?" Ken replied, "Over on Toronto Island. I used to take the ferry back-and-forth everyday. It's beautiful. At 9 o'clock at night the last ferry goes, you have the whole island to yourself. All the flower gardens are maintained... Gorgeous piece of land, I don't know what it is like now. Don't know if I'll ever get back there, now that I think about it. Maybe I should visit someday."

Before we continue with the interview, I'm thinking it must be all the talk about Valentine's Day, I'm going to share a bit of our love story and why Toronto Islands are very special to both Ken and I.

So we actually met through my parents, Tony and Camille Edwards from

Hastings. To summarize, my parents and Ken and his then fiancé Paula (name is significant) met at Toronto Island Marina because they both had boats. At this time, I was in university, very studious, very little social life! I kept hearing about this guy that my parents were falling in love with. I didn't think much of him, tall, really skinny,

greasy hair and smoked, if you knew me back then, really my opposite! Plus I was dating a guy named, wait for it, Paul. I even remember at one point my parents coming to me saying they we're going to Newfoundland with Ken to visit his parents, how weird is that. At some point we just started being at events together. I remember playing darts a lot and I specifically remember a weekend that Ken's youngest sister Christine was up

from Newfoundland for a weekend. I remember Ken and I stayed up talking for about 24 hours straight. I would say this was when we officially fell in love!

I'm going to pick up our love story with our connection to the Toronto Islands. First let's clarify the timeframe. I explained to Ken there's no way he was on the boat for 11 years. He moved to Toronto when he was 18 and if you add 11 to that it would make him 29. I pointed out we were married and living together in our first house in Toronto. We recalculated and he was on the boat for about 4 years, lol. Let me explain.



My parents bought their first boat when I was 10. It would be at docked Toronto Island Marina from May to October every year. Ken spent his adolescence on the streets of downtown St. John's, the Toronto Islands were my playground.

Ken moved to Ontario in 1987 (18yrs), bought a boat and moved to Toronto Island Marina a year later (19yrs). We started dating when we were 23. At this point he sold his boat and we moved in together. So this is how we came up with our calculation of 4 years.

Ken and I purchased the most adorable little houseboat. It was our first official "home" and it was an IKEA showroom. We only had it for two summer seasons, we bought our first real "house" very sad to sell it.

This is where we met Grace Price, the earlier viewer.



Destination #2 Over to the Toronto Islands



These two photos are from 2022. The Toronto skyline has changed. I have so many memories of sitting on the upper deck.

Toronto Island Ferry

Ferries have been going to the Island since the 1830s. The early ferries were "horse boats," powered by two or more horses walking on a circular table on the boat's deck, which set the side paddle wheels in motion. It took 30 to 40 minutes to cross.

1908 - Toronto Island ferry passengers



It travels to/from the ferry docks at Ward's Island, Centre Island and Hanlan's Point. The ferry ticket price includes the return trip. When you take the 15-minute ferry to one of the Island

docks, you can return to the city from any of the three docks.

History

Toronto Island was formed by sand and stone carried westward from the erosion of the Scarborough Bluffs. The islands, part of a series of sandbars, were once a peninsula attached to the mainland near present-day Woodbine Ave extending 9 km west into Lake Ontario and then turning north.

Back to the interview, Ken shared his thoughts and I am going to do a typical Allison report on Toronto's best kept secret.

John was curious, "There are some kinds of protections to keep it from not getting over developed." Ken replied, "They did for a long time. There have always been political debates happening. When I was living over there Ward's Island residents were still there on the east end of the island. And they were kind of living illegally but they had purchased houses at some point, so they kind of owned them. On leases from the government, some of them were running out and they were trying to get extensions. The west (he mistakenly said east) end of the island was completely vacant and the marina was in the center. I know they have been talking about developing it for years. One point in time,

the history of the island it was where all the brothels and bars were. And it was attached, it had a walk over bridge and it was all hotels, brothels and bars, back in the day, in the 20s and 30s. It was like a big strip, it was the big party zone for all the illegal activities."


I think viewers are starting to realize when Ken is "enhancing" his story. *Hotels, brothels and bars* sounds like a song title. Ken has the general idea, I'm going to give you an actual history lesson.

By the mid-1800s, the ferries that travelled to the Island were steam-powered.

Today, the City-operated Toronto Island Ferry has a fleet of four primary vessels and one heritage vessel. Each year they transport 1.4 million passengers.

From downtown Toronto, the ferry dock is located at Jack Layton Ferry Terminal on Queens Quay W at the foot of Bay St. 1925 – Crowds boarding the ferry at the Royal Canadian Yacht Club dock





Circa 1845

In 1858, a severe storm separated the peninsula from the mainland. It opened what is known as the Eastern gap, thereby turning the peninsula into an island. This happened in 1858 not the 20s and 30s, a little glitch in Ken story, no walk over bridge, lol.



There is way too much to tell you about this amazing get away so close to the big city. I'm going to highlight, I did find a wonderful article with amazing historical photos. I learned a lot and had fun putting this together.

The Toronto Islands is a popular destination. It's 4.5 km wide, about 825 acres and made up of 15 islands. The distance to walk or cycle from Ward's Island ferry dock to Hanlan's Point ferry dock is about 5.3 km. While most of the islands are connected by roads and bridges, some are only accessible by water. It's also car-free except for service and delivery vehicles.

1) Ward's Island




Let's start with Ward's Island and we can see how much of Ken's story is factual. The east side of the peninsula was settled by a fisherman named David Ward. In the mid-1800s, seasonal fishermen began camping on Ward's Island, and by the turn of the 20th century, their families joined them during the summer months. The area became known as a "tent city."

In 1931, the city permitted the Ward's Island residents to build permanent dwellings on their campsites, eventually becoming the year-round residences on Ward's Island today.

In the 1960s the residents and politicians started a 30-year battle to save the remaining homes on Ward's and Algonquin Islands. In 1993, the community's presence was secured through provincial legislation by creating a land trust. Ownership of the houses was returned to the residents with a 99-year lease on the land.

Today, about 750 people are living in 262 homes at the east end, on Algonquin and Ward's Island year-round.

2) Hanlan's Loint



In 1862, the Hanlan family settled on the Island's west side and constructed a home. John Hanlan went on to build a hotel, and the area became known as Hanlan's Point.

The Hanlan's Point amusement park operated between the 1880s and the late 1920s. The Hanlan's Point Stadium, later known as Maple Leaf Park opened in 1895. It was home to the professional baseball team, the Toronto Maple Leafs.

Both were later demolished and redeveloped to become an airport.



Fun fact#1- In 1914, Babe Ruth hit his first professional home run from Maple Leaf Park stadium.

Fun fact#2- It has been more than 80 years since the first commercial passenger flight landed at Toronto's City Airport on September 8, 1939, when a charter flight carrying famed trumpet player and conductor Tommy Dorsey and his swing-band arrived for an engagement at the CNE.

Fun fact#3-Hanlan's Point Beach in Toronto is one of only two official nude beaches in the country, with the other being Wreck Beach in Vancouver.





3) Gentre Island

Between Ward's Island and Hanlan's Point is Centre Island. Centre Island's Manitou Road, also known as the "main drag," was a thriving little town until the early 1950s. There were grocery and hardware stores, laundries, hotels, barbershops and more. There was a casino, movie theater and an outdoor bowling alley for entertainment. So I am thinking Ken was correct with the hotels, I'm sure there were bars, I found no mention of brothels, Iol.

The year-round community numbered over 2,000, with approximately 10,000 residents in the summer.



In 1956, the responsibility of Toronto Island was transferred from the city to the newly formed Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto to create a regional park. Metro Toronto Council expropriated land on the Island to compensate for waterfront parklands lost through the construction of the Gardiner Express

As leases expired, homes and businesses were demolished. By the end of the 1960s, all of the shops and 400 houses on Hanlan's Point and Centre Island had been destroyed.



Manitou Road is now known as Avenue of the Island. The pedestrian walkway on Centre Island is lined with trees, flowerbeds, hedges and reflecting pools, plus a picturesque bridge crosses over Long Pond.

It's amazing Ken and John's pretty brief discussion inspired this. I loved the trip down memory lane and learning some new facts along the way. I have put on our intentions list, we will visit the Toronto Islands again, imagine my power wheelchair rolling down the Avenue of the Island.

Today Centre Island is the most frequently visited area of the Island. One of the main attractions is Centreville Amusement Park which opened in 1967 and features rides and attractions for children. The park originally had seven rides and has expanded over the years.

I just checked they have "more than 30 rides and attractions and 14 mouth-watering food outlets." You can imagine growing up on the Island Centreville almost felt like my personal amusement park. I especially loved the log flume ride and bumper cars.


Dinosaur Jr. is an American rock band formed in Amherst, Mass in 1984. They earned a reputation as one of the formative influences on American alternative rock. You can get the limited edition repress on red or white and purple splatter vinyl.

Ken, "We are punk rockers growing up in St. John's, you leave and go away, so many years later you and Sweetapple have a label together. You have some super cool musicians who obviously believe in what you are doing. You've got J Mascis who's been doing a lot of work with you. I did notice you have one of the OFF! releases as well."

John replies with an exciting offer, "Yes I see you are wearing an OFF! hat. Yes we did a live record for them. It sounds great. I'll send you a copy if you don't have it." Ken excitedly responds, "It's probably one of the only OFF! things that I don't have... I've

got their live at the BBC and it sounds like a studio album... I've got tickets to go see them on May 7th." The Show is actually May 16th, the 7th is his birthday.

John explaining the OFF! album, "We did a live Dinosaur Jr. record and OFF! had opened up for them so we had the recording. After we did



John introduced me to an amazing artist I was not familiar with, "And we got Raymond Pettibon do the cover which is a dream come true for us... I loved his artwork since the Black Flag days." Ken agrees, "He is one of a kind, instantly



John then told us more about Pettibon's OFF! cover, "The cover caused us some trouble because our distributor was afraid that the state of Farrah Fawcett would be pissed that we used that image. At that time our distributor was owned by Sony and they were like this is going to be a lawsuit. But there were plenty of smaller indy distributors who were like we don't care...I don't think anyone really would have cared but once you are dealing in that world, their lawyers always worried about something going wrong."



Fake Names is a hardcore/ punk super group including members from Minor Threat, Bad Religion. You can get this 7" limited run on 4 vinyl colours.

Ken shared his thoughts, "I kind of get that impression from the smaller labels. I see it in the hard-core world but it's really the only world I am tuned into. Folk artists don't do 7 inches (album size, btw). That whole let's do something unique and interesting and we will only run a couple hundred copies."

Back to the interview. Ken asked, "Are you signing bands or are you licensing stuff?" John explained, "Dave and I have worked in distribution for 30 years separately and then came back together 10, 12 years ago when we started the label. And we didn't want to run a label where we are signing a band, trying to break a new band especially in this day and age, we didn't start it until 2012 The glory years were already over in the music business. So more what we are doing is... A lot of the bands are signed to other labels, so they have an established track record. So we are using our personal connections to say hey how about we do this cool record. We know you are

signed to whoever but this will be something on the side, we know we have a built in fan base. It's a little bit different. Almost more like we are doing collectible art pieces."

This pivoted into a "hot topic" for Ken, "I have a logistic question. Does it make it easier with a 7 inch for shipping? The problem I'm running into with my LPs is that it's costing me \$30 to ship one in Canada." I know isn't that shocking. Talking about shock, I think Ken was with John's response, "Canada is terrible (he clarified), I mean for that reason not in general. There is this amazing thing in America called Media Mail, so it's books, records. It's one flat price and (wait for it) the postage is under five bucks anywhere in America for a record." "Ugh," was Ken's response.

John continued, "The sad thing is it has gone way up overseas so now I have to pay \$24 to Canada and \$25 overseas. But within America as long as Media Mail exists. it's the lifeblood of the mail order industry in America." Ken shares, "In Canada everything has gone to Amazon, which is fine they run a great service. Their machine is impeccable... The small business scene in Canada is dead. It's \$30 for

me to ship a hat." John shared more shocking news, "That's crazy. Even if Media Mail didn't exist, if I had to use priority it would be like 10 bucks on the East Coast and 15 dollars to California to send a record. And a hat you could ship for 6 or 7 dollars anywhere in the country." Ken, "That's the way it used to be here too."

Media Mail came through and Ken received a special package from Outer Battery Records.

Thanks to John Pastore for the gift of vinyl. What a treat to find these albums in the mail today. Outer Battery Records releases of OFF!, Fake Names and Obits . Listening to "new to me" The Obits and it is totally groovy. Can't wait to dig into some live OFF! later in the day and of course The Fake Names include Brian baker (Minor Threat, Dag Nasty, Bad Religion)... Thanks Johnny!!!



The Obits flew south for an Australian tour. This live album was recorded in Brisbane in 2012. Die at the Zoo is a 12 song LP that captures the Obits at their peak.

Ken was back to his original question about 7 inch records to help with shipping costs, "So I was thinking of going to 7 inches because I could go back to shipping them for three or four dollars and do two 7" per record." John shared his thoughts about this, "People like 7 inch. We have done a few of them because they're cool and they're cheaper than a record obviously. There is not a lot of profit margin in a 7" it's a lot easier to break even with them." Ken agrees, "Everything is about breaking even these days. I don't know if there is anyone who is making profit. I'm just trying to find ways to get people



John then shared an interesting perspective, "Canada is a small market but a giant country. If you are servicing the whole country (Ken interjected 'it's massive') yes and yet there is only under 40 million people. There is as many people within 10 miles of where I am sitting as there is in almost all of Canada." Wow, let that sink in. John, "America by itself, there are just so many people that live here it could support the label by itself."

Ken moving the interview along, "You have great artists on the label, legendary artists for lack of a better word, the iconic punk rock people of the early days. And they are showing you support... So are you both in New York?" John replied, "No Dave is in Brattleboro, Vermont." He goes on to explain Dave's involvement with Surefire Distribution before joining him to start Outer Battery Records.



Ken reflects with a punk rock history lesson before asking his next question, "I grew up listening to a bunch of music I fell in love with punk rock while skateboarding and meeting all of you guys downtown. The scene and the culture was electric for lack of a better word. It was such a great time in my life and I think for all of us a very memorable time. And I know those formative years certain impressions stick with you, the type of music you listen to, certain movies you saw, things like that. And I know bands like Stiff Little Fingers, Television, Minor Threat, Hüsker Dü, DOA, SNFU, you name it, those were the bands that were impacting all of us back home in the scene.

I remember the change when COC (Corrosion of Conformity) became popular, when shred metal came in, speedcore and all that stuff. And the transition from D.R.I. (Dirty Rotten Imbeciles, first time ever hearing these

band names) being a punk band to a metal band I think would be the right word (according to google they were a crossover thrash band which is a fusion of thrash metal and hardcore punk). I kind of lost interest in the hard-core scene. It seemed like the bands that I was into were folding out and the new stuff coming in (he never finished this thought, lol). And then years later I talk to my kids about punk rock and they are dealing with Avril Lavigne saying that she is the pioneer of punk and bands like Sum 41 taking all the credit while Chi Pig is still alive living as an addict on the street in Vancouver."

Ken is sounding very "bitter" I'm going to give a little background.



Kendall Steven Chinn known as Mr. Chi Pig, was a Canadian punk rock vocalist born in Edmonton and long residing in Vancouver. He fronted the hard-core punk band SNFU from 1981 until their hiatus in 2018. He was also an early advocate for queer identity in punk rock. Many struggles with addiction and mental health problems and he died at age 57.



Sum 41 is a Canadian rock band from Ajax, Ontario, formed in 1996. They have been classified as pop punk, skate punk to alternative rock.



Interestingly (or gossipy) Avril Lavigne was married to the lead singer of Sum 41 Deryck Whibley for 3 years. Avril it appears likes singers. She was married briefly to Chad Krueger of Nickelback. After a year they separated.

Ken continues reflecting building up to the question, "Every time I go into a record store I go to the punk section, often the metal section, they put the punk in with the metal because they usually don't have a punk section. And I will find things like old Suicidal Tendencies (L.A. crossover thrash, 1980)...Every now and again I will try something of the newer punk aside from OFF! that's in a different category. There is some cool stuff, even like the Bronx (L.A. punk band, 2002). It's got so much flavor of modern production and rock that I am not finding anything that has that sort of old sound. So the question is (yes finally the question, IoI) does that still exist and where does an old punk rocker like myself, where do we pick up what's new and current that has that sort of sound and value to it?"



Avril Lavigne. I enjoy her music but I am not very familiar with her story. When she put out her first album we were 33, the girls were three and one, I'm not surprised Avril Lavigne was not in our cd collection. I found this one really interesting. I've become a little bit of a groupie, Iol.

Avril Lavigne is a Canadian singer and songwriter. At age 16 (how crazy young is that, she's now 38), she signed a two-album recording deal with Arista Records. Her debut studio album, Let Go (2002), is the best-selling album of the 21st century by a Canadian artist. It yielded the singles "Complicated" and "Sk8er Boi", which emphasized a skate punk persona and earned her the title "Pop-Punk Queen" from music publications. She is considered a key musician in the development of pop-punk music since she paved the way for female-driven, punk-influenced pop music in the early 2000s. Her second studio album, Under My Skin (2004), became Lavigne's first album to reach the top of the Billboard 200 chart in the United States, going on to sell 10 million copies worldwide.

Fun fact- She was born in Belleville (our closest large town, 45km) and grew up in Napanee. Going to stop here, I could go on and on. What an amazing journey and an inspiring woman.

I am thinking this may be a hard question to answer let's see how John handles it, "I'm in the same position as you. Recording technologies are so far advanced now that you would have to go retro to try to make it sound like it did for us. Even a little band can do something with proTools where you're like oh that sounds great. It's so easy to clean up that sound... While we couldn't make it sound sound any better even if we wanted to. And that's where the charm of it was... I agree it's too slick sounding, it's just not right to our ears."

Ken had one last question, "I've been on the fence about a band and I don't know why. I haven't had this love-hate relationship with a band in a long time. I'm curious if you are aware of them and what you think. What's your take on Idles?" John, "Oh... it doesn't work for me, I don't get it. I'm not quite sure why they're as big as they are. I can respect it, I can see why some people are into it... Apparently the live show is amazing." Ken's opinion, "I saw them on a TV show and I went omg this caught my eye... I bought a record... after two or three listens I kind of went this feels like a scam." Ultimately they are both going to hold off on their final decision until they see them live, Iol.



The interview wraps up with John filling us in on what's next for Outer Battery Records: the new Heavy Blanket album, just came out and is doing great; a Fake Names single just released, it has Brian



Idles are a British rock band formed in Bristol in 2009. At a 2018 concert the lead singer said: "For the last time, we're not a forking punk band." Ken what do you think of that?

Baker from Minor Threat on guitar, which was a dream opportunity for John; and a Swervedriver record (Oxford, England, alternative rock, 1989), it's the original recording of their first demo, circa 1990, it sounds great, available in late May.

After the interview, Ken was worried it would be too personal and not interesting for viewers. I reminded him this is a free show, lol. More importantly he loved reminiscing with John, "Man it's nice to reconnect... it's nice to talk and realize you are the same person I remember." This is what it's all about, and we the viewers get to watch. Llew commented, "Awesome to see you John! Been a long time!"



Ken always does an amazing job thanking guests and "closing" off the whatta ya at? often with a one-liner, tonight's sounded more like a tagline. Ken, "John thanks for coming out and spending some time with us and reconnecting with me and telling me all about the label that you and Dave have been doing. Say hi to Dave for me as well." Here comes the tagline. "I wish you all the best with everything keeping punk rock alive man, it's nice that there are people like you still doing that."

A pretty amazing interview which was put together completely out of the blue, last minute and it fit perfectly for our 2nd Annual Punk Show. What will he do next year?

Just like he is searching for a tagline to end the Show, Ken is experimenting with hand gestures as a close off for the whatta ya at?. Tonight's was the three fingered peace sign. He had a really interesting on a few weeks ago at the end of Tavis Stanley's interview. I'm kidding he's not looking for a hand gesture, what you're about to read will explain a lot.


SHOW Gear Talk...

Starting this month Ken is officially taking over the Gear Talk feature in the magazine. I was proud of myself, I admitted I can't do it all and asked for help. Take it away Ken...

In the last month we have attempted a microphone shootout. Using our trusted Lewitt LCT 240 as the baseline (it has been a great mic for us for the last 6 months) we started with a test against the Lewitt LCT 440 Pure. This mic had a very similar sound however added a fair bit of gain to the signal (12db estimate) making it able to easily capture vocal detail. In our application this mic was a worthy upgrade as it did have a little more 'warmth' than the 240. Also the LCT 440 does come with a really nice shock mount making it a more stable choice.



For the next two weeks we attempted to compare with the ART AR5 (not pictured) however on each attempt the microphone failed and noise was the result. We believe this was a dud from the factory and will get another of the same to put into the testing waters in a future episode.



For the low price point I can recommend this mic for any home studio. For us it needed a little help from a preamp but once it got cooking it really worked well for vocals.



The Luck Of The Trish















Here is this month's meditation. I have mixed feelings when I hear the word lucky. In my life I have generally felt very lucky, too many things to list.

A couple huge unexpected twists in my journey. My dad passing so early and my MS. I was feeling pretty opposite of lucky. However there are numerous times Ken and I will look at each other and maybe not use the word lucky but definitely feel blessed. I really liked the perspective of lucky in this meditation.



I (meditation writer) am often asked if I believe in luck. I do but not as a matter of chance or magic rather I think of it more as something we make. While I believe we can't control our future we can roll out the carpet for serendipity. This meditation is about opportunities and the steps you can take to increase your good fortune.

Some years ago psychologist Richard Wiseman had a question, what makes some people lucky and others unlucky? Was it a matter of chance, was there something that they did or didn't do. To find the answer Wiseman studied more than 400 people who described themselves as either lucky or not.

In one test he gave them a newspaper and asked them to count all the photographs. Most of the lucky people finished in seconds while the unlucky group generally took about two minutes. What's up with that? Well on page 2 there was a message, it read stop counting, there are 43 photographs in this paper. The unlucky people were so busy looking for photos they didn't see the note. Again and again across a variety of tests, the unlucky people overlooked things and that's why they missed out.

Luck might seem like a magical super power but it often comes down to simply noticing opportunities. I love this research because I find it so empowering. Obviously there is a lot in life that we cannot control but there is a lot that we can do to increase the odds that so-called luck will find us.

Part of it comes down to paying attention, to being present in the moment, and observing what's around you. Basically stop looking so hard for the photos that you miss the text. I think of it as having an opportunity mindset. It is about assuming that opportunities are all around you, like Easter eggs and you are just hunting for them.

There was another part of Wiseman's research study that was important. Lucky people are not only better at noticing opportunities they are also better at creating them. Wiseman found that lucky people are more likely to talk to diverse groups at parties. While the unlucky tend to seek out out people similar to themselves. Lucky people are more apt to break from routine and try new things. While the unlucky are creatures of habit.

Essentially the wider you cast your net, the more luck you're liable to catch. So be more open, expose your self to a variety of people and ideas. Even if you are not the most outgoing person, that's OK, you can still read, listen and watch broadly so that you are taking in diverse information and perspectives. But you have to pay attention, put yourself out there, seek out something different from the norm.

As baseball Hall of Famer Branch Rickey once said,

luck is the residue of design.

So when you approach life with an opportunity mindset, you are more likely to luck out.

Ken and I often reflect on our journey, MS diagnosis to my stem cell transplant, to the pandemic, which all lead to where we are today, the Whiskey Wednesday Show. Are we lucky? I would say so!

The life of an album's creation and recording can sometimes be a long and difficult road. This month the Watchmen announced the release of Silent Radar Deluxe. As you can see this album was demo'ed, recorded and re-recorded before release. Months turn into years and sometimes, if you're lucky, you end up with an amazing product. Once we get near the end of the year, and if there has been enough interest in the music we have been releasing then we will be looking at a limited run vinyl of the complete record. Who knows maybe all the hurdles have led us to this point for a reason. I try not to question it too much, just going with the flow I quess.







Silent Radar was their fourth studio album and contained numerous hits including "Stereo," "Say Something," and "Any Day Now." The album was certified Gold in Canada in 1998.

Remember somewhere in a previous episode Ken was telling us how the Watchmen used technology very early on. The CD included a CD-activated key to access multi-media material in a secret area of the band's website. The CD activated website was the first use of this technology for a major-label band.

The official press release is quite long, here is the nuts and bolts of the big announcement Ken kept secret....
"Canadian rock band **The Watchmen** announce **Silent Radar Deluxe Anniversary Edition** set for release on April 14 via Universal Music Canada. Available for pre-order now, the digital only album celebrates the 25th anniversary of Silent Radar with 46 specially curated tracks recorded at a time when the band was arguably at their peak as a live band and songwriters."









This album provided the band with their third Juno nomination as they were nominated for Best Rock Album at the 1999 Juno Awards. The band lost the award to The Tragically Hip, they were always their biggest competition, lol.


